Washington, Dec. 28.—Pitcher Walter Johnson's signed contract for the season of 1921, his fifteenth season in major league baseball, was received in the mail today by President-Manager Griffith of the Washington American League Club. Johnson wrote from his farm near Coffeyville, Kansas, that the injury to his arm during the season last season had yielded to treatment, and that he expected to regain his former effectiveness. Johnson will be 34 years old on his next birthday.

TO THE ELECTORS OF WARD 4
