major result areas, of which the following relate more specifically to the Alcohol, Tobacco and Drug Resources Fund: effective information and advocacy programs; effective education programs; effective means of early identification and intervention; effective treatment and rehabilitation measures. The explicit purposes of the fund are: to facilitate community mobilization and action that support the achievement of priority goals; to experiment with and demonstrate the effectiveness of new programs or methodologies that have application beyond the immediate location of the project; and to facilitate joint action with one or more provinces, voluntary or professional groups or businesses where such action will facilitate achievement of priority goals and will have application beyond the immediate location of the project. Any public or private health or social service agency, community or citizens' organization or individual, with demonstrated ability to conceptualize, develop and manage demonstration projects in the above-noted areas, is eligible for consideration for financial support under the Alcohol, Tobacco and Drug Resources Fund. (c) The extramural research programs of the Non-Medical Use of Drugs Directorate have as their primary function the encouragement and support of research directed to providing information about all facets of the non-medical use of drugs. The directorate is particularly interested in research projects which will result in the development of scientific information pertinent to prevention, treatment and rehabilitation programs dealing with problems associated with drug abuse. Applications are assessed for scientific merit with particular reference to the adequacy of the methodology including specification of the subject sample, procedures, statistical design and analysis, when appropriate. Investigators holding an academic appointment in any Canadian educational institution, having an affiliation with an accredited treatment facility, or holding an appointment in a private or public research laboratory are eligible to apply for research support under this program. Occasionally proposals from other persons possessing less formal qualifications for research but having special interest and opportunities relevant to the NMUD priorities will be considered for support.
