

has attended it and the benefits which it has conferred on the community, and the obligation under which the people of this city lie to those ladies who have interested themselves in the work of the Association and have been instrumental in promoting a higher education for young women in anticipation of the more definite collegiate studies of which they are now to have the advantage," was moved by Prof. Johnson, who spoke in favor of continuing the Association in a modified form—taking up different subjects not included in the College course. He referred to the influence of its work in the past, and advocated its continuance as an assistance to the University in looking after lady students who might come from a distance to attend the classes, and who would do so with more confidence if a ladies' committee were ready to receive them, to find lodgings, and to help them in any difficulties.

Principal MacVicar seconded the motion, and the meeting was closed with prayer.
