She is the oldest inhabitant of the community, being in her eighty-ninth year. She was the daughter of the late Caleb Davis of Bellefleur. Four children survive her—Henry Hamm and Mrs. G. A. Walters of Grand Bay; Mrs. Mann and Mrs. Clark of Boston. She also leaves three sisters—Mrs. Dunham of Oregon, Miss Davis and Mrs. Fenjoy of St. John. Two half-brothers, Caleb and William Davis of Petticoat, also survive her. The funeral will be held at the Baptist church at Grand Bay on Saturday afternoon at three o'clock.
