

This is what Dr. Chipman, the government veterinary, who passed upon horses presented for sale at Kingston last year for the use of Canadian troops, bound overseas, told John F. Cropley, of Kingston, one of the witnesses who testified at today's sitting of the Royal Commission, now here investigating the purchase of horses in this county.
