

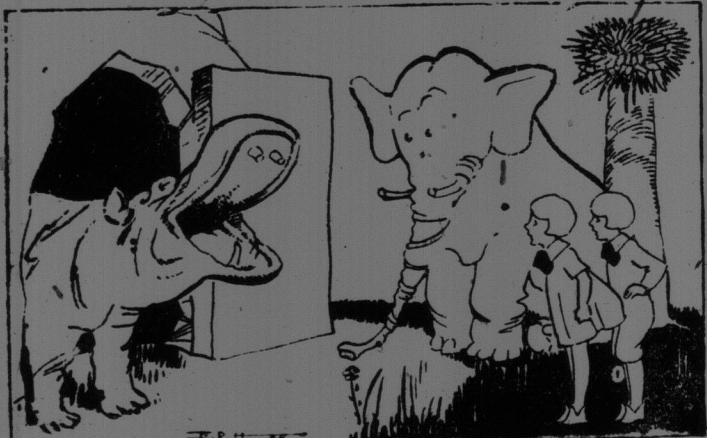

MEDICAL SOCIETY WILL MEET HERE

Several Visiting Doctors Expected for Annual Session Next Week.

The forty-fourth annual meeting of the New Brunswick Medical Society will be held in the General Public Hospital and in the Opera House in St. John on Aug. 19 and 20 and it is expected that a large number of the doctors of the province will be in attendance. The provincial laboratory and the new X-ray department of the General Public Hospital will be thrown open for the inspection of the visiting doctors and Dr. H. L. Abramson, provincial pathologist, and Dr. A. S. Kirkland, the hospital radiologist, will be on hand to give any required information. Visiting specialists will give papers on important subjects. Dr. John G. McDougall, F. A. C. S., of Halifax, will attend as the representative of the Nova Scotia Medical Society and will also give a paper.

At the close of the evening session on the first day the medical profession of St. John will tender an informal supper to the visiting men at the Union Club.

SAY MARITIMES NOT ADVERTISED

Scottish Editors See Many Opportunities for Settlement Here.

Moncton, Aug. 15.—The Maritime Provinces are full of possibilities for the settlers and should appeal to a large number of Scottish people who wish to emigrate to the Dominion, declared Colonel Edward V. Watt, of Aberdeen, Scotland, who in company with James Reid, of the Dumfries and Galloway Standard has been making an inspection of the Maritime Provinces with a view to advising the people of his country as to the best places in which to settle.

Those possibilities are not advertised properly, however, he added, and the people seldom hear the news. This is in marked contrast with the other parts of the Dominion, which are constantly telling

the tale of their advantages to prospective settlers.

Fredrickton, Aug. 14.—The Scottish editors, who were brought to the Maritime Provinces, after the others of their party who had been on the western tour, had left for the Old Country, arrived here by motor, this evening, having come across the province, from Moncton via Apolauqui, Cole's Island and Jernise. Their tour was arranged by the Colonization and Development Department of the Canadian National Railways at Montreal.

This evening, before boarding the Newcastle express, en route to Montreal, both the editors gave expression of their delight in visiting the Maritime Provinces. They confirmed the often heard opinion, that the country in the east, more closely resembles the British Isles, than any other part of Canada, and also said that farming methods more closely approximated those in the Old Country.

With regard to emigration from Scotland to Canada, they said that in no part which they had visited, did they see anything to alter their opinion that a man from the Old Country would prosper, if he worked hard. The Maritimes were no exception.

They made particular reference to seed potato culture, and to the fields which they had seen and also expressed the opinion that the parts of New Brunswick through which they had passed today, gave every promise as agricultural sections.

COOLIDGE ACCEPTS PARTY NOMINATION

Promises Government of Common Sense, Dedicated To Honesty.

Washington, Dec. 14.—A "Government of common sense," dedicated to honesty and economy at home and peace abroad, was promised tonight by President Calvin Coolidge in formally accepting the nomination of the Republican party as its candidate for President.

Declaring domestic affairs of chief concern to the nation, Mr. Coolidge proposed further tax reduction and

"more tax reform" and announced his intention to appoint a committee to investigate means of aiding agriculture.

He summed up the foreign policy of the administration in a single word—peace—and promised to propose after the Dawes reparation plan gets under way another conference to consider further limitation of armaments and codification of international law.

Detail of Views.

Detailing his views, the President announced he favored:

The principle of protection.

The child labor amendment.

The permanent court of international justice.

Further limitation of armaments.

Support by the Government in encouraging American citizens and resources to assist in restoring Europe.

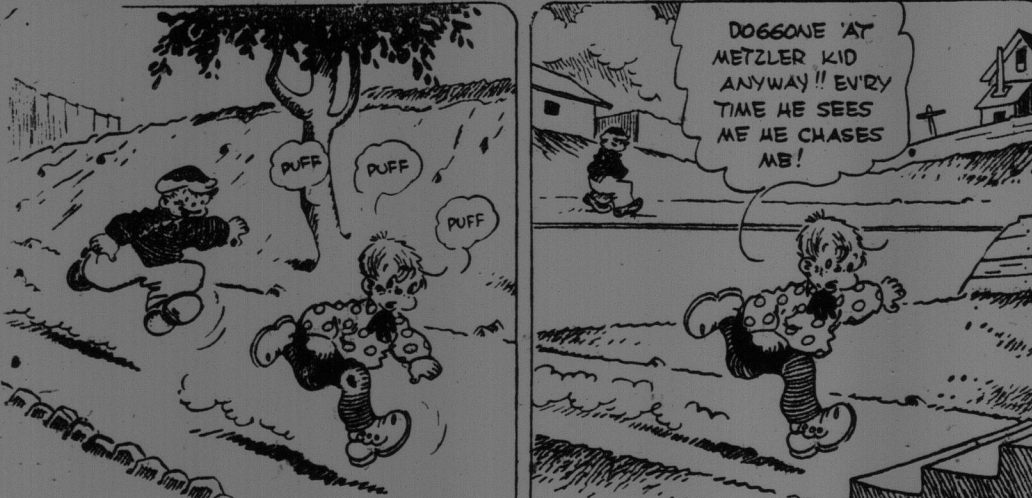
Enforcement of the prohibition laws.

Specifically he declared opposition to any general extension of government ownership and control and to aggressive war.

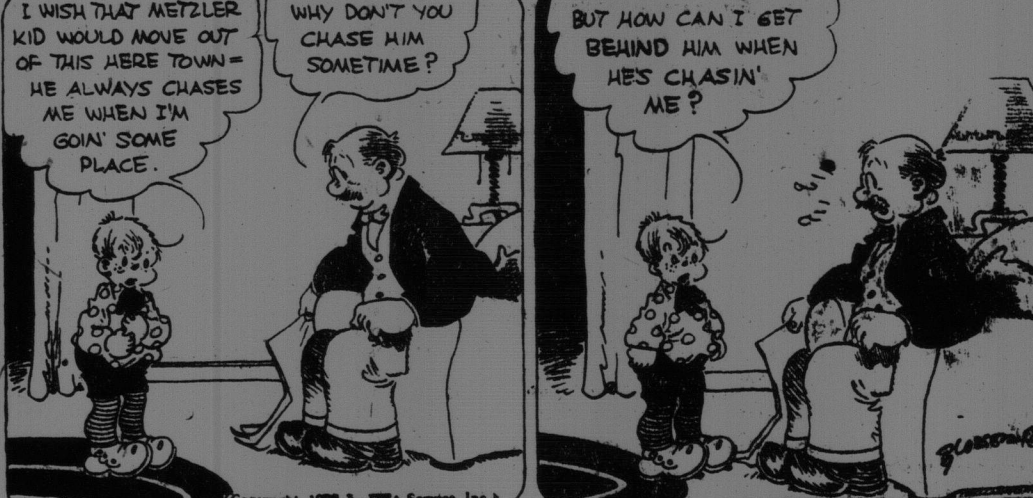
The nominee laid particular stress on agriculture, taxes and foreign relations.
