

## WESTMORLAND COUNCIL AGREES

Moncton, N. B., Jan. 18.—At this morning's session of the Westmorland County Council a letter from Premier W. E. Foster stated that the Halifax School for the Blind had requested the New Brunswick government to pass legislation increasing the annual grant for each pupil from \$300 to \$400, the latter amount having been granted by the Province of Nova Scotia.

"As this will mean an additional tax of \$50 per pupil upon each municipality," wrote Premier Foster, "I will be glad to be advised if the passage of such legislation at the next session of the house will be concurred in by your council."

The council unanimously concurred in the proposed legislation.

## CASE OF YOUNG ESMONDE

London, Jan. 19.—The government at Melbourne has directed that Ormond Gratian Esmonde, who was regarded by it as a Sinn Féin emissary, be not allowed to land from the steamer Makura, which is tied up in Sydney harbor by a strike, says a despatch to the London Times from Melbourne.

It is said that Esmonde had had eight days in which to decide whether to take the oath of allegiance and that he has not made up his mind the government considers that he should not be a desirable citizen in Australia.

Esmonde is a son of Sir Thomas Henry Gratian Esmonde, former member of the British Parliament for North Westford, Ireland.
