To The Editor of The Times: Sir:—Will you be kind enough to lend your valuable space to the following: On Monday evening, May 24, the West End Intermediate Baseball League opened its schedule with a game between St. Rose's of Fairville and St. George's A. C. of Carleton. Several games have been played during the ensuing period and the attendance has steadily grown until well upwards of 1,000 people have been at some of the later games.

Now, Mr. Editor, as some of us know who are more or less associated with the game, it costs a lot of money to conduct any kind of a ball club that pretends to play fairly fast ball. Perhaps there are a lot of folks who do not realize this. For their benefit let them scan this list.

Balls, \$27.00 dozen.  
 Mask, \$8.00 or \$9.00 each.  
 Catcher's Mitt, \$14.00 to \$20.00 each.  
 First Base Mitt, \$8.00 to \$10.00 each.  
 Fielder's Gloves, \$8.00 to \$9.00 each.  
 Bats, \$2.00 to \$3.50 each.  
 Uniforms, \$10.00 to \$20.00 each.  
 Shoes, \$8.00 to \$12.00 per pair.

Now with this list before them for comparison, and remembering that it is almost necessary to use at least two new balls each game, let me state that the collections have averaged up to two cents per spectator. We have taken in an average of \$12 a game after paying our officials and giving a third to each team, and the grounds, there is about three dollars for each team. That is estimating on the basis of fine weather and good crowds.

Now sir, a word to the wise should be sufficient. We think that when the facts are laid before them, the people of West St. John will respond and support the boys who are providing clean wholesome entertainment for them. Two many of our spectators are looking at the car tracks that should not be there, when the box comes around.

## FEAR OF RAILWAY STRIKE IN THE UNITED STATES

A downward revision of 12 per cent in wages is to be effected on Canadian railways, to operating staffs, to be followed by a revision of working conditions. Concurrent action by all Canadian roads will be taken, it is understood, on Friday when preliminary arrangements will be made.
