## QUEBEC MINISTERS IN BY ACCLAMATION

Nominations in Several Ontario Constituencies Are Announced

Quebec, Sept. 8—Saturday was nomination day in the counties of Bellechasse, Arthabaska and Terrebonne for by-elections necessary by the graduation of Hon. Messrs. Galigneault, Perreault and David to the Gouin cabinet as minister of public works, minister of colonization, mines and fisheries and as provincial secretary respectively, and all three ministers were returned by acclamation.

Toronto, Sept. 8—Two candidates were named by the Independent labor party to contest seats in Toronto at the next provincial election as the result of a meeting of that body. They are John Vick, who will oppose Joseph Russell in Riverdale and Secretary Buckley, of the I. L. Perth, Ont., Sept. 8—Warden Chris Forbes, of Lanark county, was nominated by North Lanark Liberals as standard bearer in the coming provincial elections.

Woodstock, Ont., Sept. 8—The Independent labor party has nominated John Scott as their candidate for the legislature.

## MONTREAL GIRL ACCIDENTALLY SHOTS AND KILLS SWEETHEART

Montreal, Sept. 8—Yesterday morning Paul Clermont, twenty-five years old, was shot through the head by his sweetheart, Blanche Beaubien, at her residence, 177 City Hall avenue. The man died a short time later in the General Hospital, and the girl is held by detectives pending inquiry.

## FAMILY COURTS TO CURB DIVORCE EVIL

Chief Justice Hoffman Urges Them Before Criminal Law Institute

Boston, Sept. 7—The establishment of "family courts" to meet the menace to the marriage relation presented in this country by the divorce evil, was recommended by Chief Justice Charles W. Hoffman of the court of domestic relations at Cincinnati, Ohio, in an address before the American Institute of Criminal Law and Criminology. The institute is one of several organizations holding their sessions here in connection with the annual meeting of the American Bar Association which was continued Thursday.

"Marriage as an institution is endangered in America today through the divorce evil, and the only way to save it is by the establishment of family courts in which social evidence, as distinguished from legal, will be considered," Judge Hoffman said.

"There will be more than 400,000 divorce cases filed before the courts of the land this year, and something must be done to save our family life, the greatest civilizing force we have," he continued.

"The family court should be an extension of the principle upon which juvenile courts are founded."

"It will be possible, under this system, to co-ordinate the work of the juvenile and divorce divisions of the court and obtain reliable scientific data. This is the final purpose of the family court, and it will be through the facts developed that the requisite knowledge and information necessary for the regulation of marriage and divorce will be acquired."

"In 1916 there were 112,000 divorces granted in this country, showing an increase of 55.5 per cent. over 1909. No scientific law has ever been made on the subject of divorce. Divorces are granted for certain causes, but no effort is made to classify primary causes. The divorce records show that by far the greater number of divorces are granted for adultery and a survey of the methods of administering the divorce laws would reveal that if the real cause had been disclosed at many other trials the greater
