Hon. Mr. Veniot Inspects Roads

"The road from St. John to St. Stephen is in excellent condition at the present time and there are several sections of it that are equal to, if not better, than the Maine State gravel road," said Hon. P. J. Veniot, minister of public works in the provincial government, last night at the Dufferin Hotel.

Mr. Veniot, although called to the city as a witness in a legal case now being tried here, took the opportunity of going over the roads near the city and these roads will most certainly benefit by his visit.

An inspection of the road from Nerepis to the city was made during Mr. Veniot's trip to St. John, and this road, Mr. Veniot said, was in splendid condition with the exception of about three miles in different places which required some patrol work and building up. This work has already been ordered by the minister and will be carried out immediately.

Since coming to the city Mr. Veniot

has inspected the road to Spruce Lake and was over the four miles of narrow road in that vicinity and laid out some work that is necessary to be done. "This road is not in as good condition as we would like to have it," said the minister, "but we intend to do as much work as we possibly can upon it this season." From Spruce Lake to Lepreau the road is in fine shape.

An inspection of the work at the quarry and the activities by the provincial government workmen on the Marsh road and undertaken yesterday afternoon by the minister. With respect to the Marsh road Mr. Veniot said: "I find that the street railway is laying a turn-out on the Marsh road, near the Fernhill cemetery that will be a great convenience to the traveling public. It has carried this turn-out along the road in such a way as to make it almost dangerous to the public. It is my intention to see the street railway authorities in this matter in an effort to have this remedied. The company, I believe, holds that it does not require the permission of the department of public works in order to put in this turn-out, but I am of the opinion that the permission of the department should have been received before the work was done. At any rate I will see the company in connection with the matter."

On leaving the city Mr. Veniot will go over the road between St. John and Moncton with a view of laying out some sort of a programme for work on this road and the repairs necessary in the Annapolis district.

1,450,000 U. S. TROOPS IN FRANCE BY AUGUST

Washington, June 26.—Secretary Baker disclosed to the senate military committee today that within three months an enlarged army project now being worked out will be presented to congress to represent the maximum fighting force of the country.

General March, chief of staff, already has announced that the army is five months ahead of schedule in troop movements, 900,000 men having been shipped abroad. During the debate today, however, it was disclosed that if the highest hopes are realized, 1,450,000 men will have reached France some time in August, and that there will be a total force under arms of approximately 8,500,000. A statement read into the senate record by Senator Chamberlain, chairman of the military committee, predicted that class one probably would be exhausted during October, and would be reduced to 641,126 men by calls to be made before August 1.

OWING TO SHORTAGE OF LABOR FEMALES MAY WORK AT NIGHT.

Quebec, Que., June 26.—In order to allow greater production for war purposes, the provincial government has decided to allow the employment of girls over eighteen for night work, thus suspending the law which forbids the employment of females for night work. The law deals mostly with girls who are working in munition places, and according to the law could not be employed on the night staff.

It will also apply to girls in shoe factories, where large orders are being turned out for the Allies.




