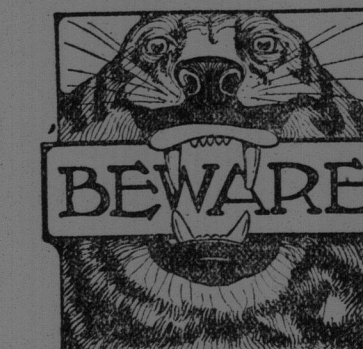

CARUSO TO SING ON FIRST NIGHT

Aida Will Be Opening Bill of The
New York Opera
Season

SOME OF THE SINGERS

Concert Season of More Than
600 Performances Has Started—
Musical Notes of Interest From
the Metropolis of the United
States

(Times Special Correspondence)

New York, Nov. 1.—Ludwig Thuille's
"Lohentanz," one of the new operas prom-
ised by the Metropolitan Opera Company
management will have its initial American
presentation during the first New York
week of opera, Johanna Gadski, the so-
prano, and Herman Jadower, whose first
appearances two seasons ago brought re-
cognition, will have the leading roles and
Alfred Hertz will conduct.

Instead of opening with "The Girl of the
Golden West," as originally planned, the
first night opera on November 13 will be
"Aida" and Caruso, who has been singing
with all his accustomed form in Vienna,
Berlin and Hamburg, will be in the cast.
The chief interest, naturally, will center in
the Italian tenor for everyone musically in-
clined is anxious to know at first hand
precisely the present condition of his
voice.

"Koeniglicher" with Farrar and Jad-
lower. "The Girl of the Golden West,"
in which Caruso, Destinn and Amato will
be heard. "Tristan and Isolde" with
Farrar and Riccardo Martin singing the
leading parts, are the remaining works for
the opening week at the Metropolitan.
The tentative season's schedule calls for
more than 170 performances in the twenty-
two weeks.

A work in which the public is showing
an interest is the announced possible re-
vival of "William Tell." This opera is sel-
dom given because of the difficulty of find-
ing a tenor with a voice of sufficient power
and resource in the highest register to sing
the role of Arnold. In Leo Slezak, the
Czech tenor, Giulio Gatti-Casazza de-
clares he has a principal capable of doing the
music fullest possible justice. The success
of Slezak in this part on the other side
would indicate that a wise selection has
been made.

The concert season in New York, which
will number more than six hundred per-
formances before spring makes its ap-
pearance, has started and we have heard Vlad-
imir de Pachmann, who returned with a
fine crop of hair and his exquisite art still
unimpaired; Edvard Werrenrath, a prom-
ising baritone who needs further vocal de-
velopment to reach the goal he is striving
for; Efraim Zimbalist, the Russian violin-
ist; Harold Bauer, pianist, and the Ameri-
can debut of the Philharmonic Symphony
Orchestra's new conductor, Josef Stransky.

The engagement of that admirable young
basso, Clifford Cairns, for performances of
"The Messiah" by the Harmonic Club, of
Cleveland, and the Arion Society, of Provi-
dence, gives this singer further opportu-
nity to display his abilities which are most
commendable. The determination of this
singer to present an entire programme of
songs shortly after the New Year will of-
fer every chance to measure his vocal and
artistic equipment, for there is no test as
difficult for the singer as the song recital.

Music lovers of this city are eager for
the coming concert of the Theodore
Thomas Orchestra, which will take place
in mid-December. It is many years since
this excellent organization visited the east
and apart from the concern in discovering
the musical development there will also be
the opportunity of gauging the strength of
Frederick Stock's conducting resources.

News of Musical World

Reginald de Koven, whose skill opened
the way for the American composer in this
country in the field of Opera Bouffe, will
soon have another work credited to the
long list he has already brought. "The
Wedding Trip," is the name of the newest
work by the author of "Robin Hood," and
its premiere takes place very soon.

List Centenary programmes are being
given all over the world by the representa-
tive symphony orchestras. The great com-
poser was born October 22, 1811. The New
York Symphony Society has just given the
first concert of the season devoted to Liszt
writings.

That admirable cellist, Paulo Gruppé,
who is playing in Europe with such credit
to himself, sails shortly for this side of
the Atlantic to begin his season, which
will be long and call him to the principal
cities of the United States and Canada.

New York opera goers are interested in
the appearance of Marguerite Mattonneau,
the German contralto, who is expected to
make her American debut the first night
of the Metropolitan's season as Amneris in
"Aida." She sings equally well in Eng-
lish, German and French.

Another operatic newcomer who will
shortly have his vocal and artistic abilities
measured is the American basso, Putnam
Griswold. According to accounts he is one
of the foremost of living basses, and, if
this be so, his addition to the Metropolitan
roster of principals was a proper manage-
rial move.

For the first time in her American career
Mary Garden has sung the role of Car-
men in the Bizet opera of that name. Last
night, in opening the Philadelphia season,
Miss Garden was heard and seen as the
cigarette girl. She sang the part in New
York later.

Sir John Jackson, one of the English
contractors, who tendered for the work
at Courtenay Bay, accompanied by A.
Brooks, of Montreal, was in St. John yester-
day and paid a visit to Courtenay Bay.
It is understood that some of the unsuc-
cessful contractors are seeking to have
new tenders called.
