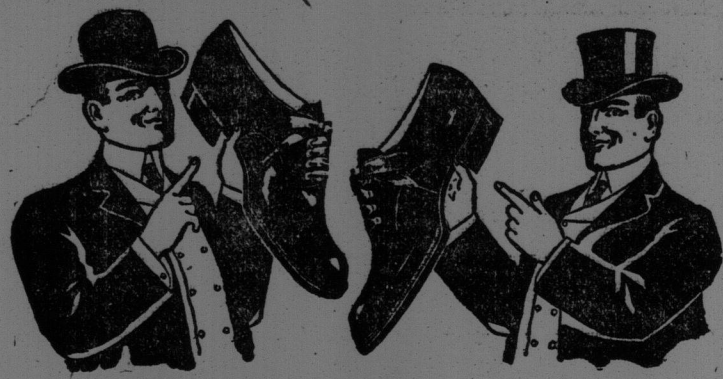

FLEMMING NOW DOES THE THING HE CRITICIZED

Large Sum Paid to Lawyers Hired By His Government—Read This Statement of Facts

Frederick, May 20.—Some of the government supporters and newspapers are fond of referring to the fact that years ago legal gentlemen belonging to the Liberal party did some work for the local government of that day and received payment for the same. At that time they were in opposition and were equally anxious then to declaim against the usefulness of the solicitor general.

They could not see why the criminal business of the province should not all be handled by the attorney general himself, whom the wanted, in addition, to look after the collecting of the succession duties without receiving any additional remuneration. In fact, they thought that all legal work with the government should be done by the attorney general in consideration of the amount he received in connection with that portfolio.

Their memories have as usual proved to be very short. A reference to the Public Accounts of 1910 and 1911 will show that the Hazen-Fleming government were very generous indeed, to the lawyers who supported them. In the amounts paid for the administration of justice in 1910 there are two separate sums, one of \$601.00 and the other of \$127.75 paid out to criminal prosecution outside altogether of the work done by the attorney general, and it should be added, by the same party.

Under the heading of "Criminal Prosecutions," in 1910 it will be noted that Powell & Jones, of Kings, W. F. Keston and T. J. Carter, of Victoria County; J. B. M. Baxter, of St. John; H. H. James, of Kent; T. W. Butler, of Northumberland; J. S. Harquail, of Restigouche; R. B. Hanson, of York; J. C. Hartley, of Charlottetown; A. J. Leane, of Westmorland; W. A. Mott, of Restigouche; all had a share in the plums that were handed out.

Mr. Baxter, of St. John, under the heading is paid the comfortable sum of \$1,000 for "Services re Judicature Act"; and E. C. Weyman, of Kings county, received \$1,200 and \$225 additional for expenses, while the Hon. Mr. Hazen, the attorney general, had \$275 in addition to his \$2,100 as attorney general and \$600 in round numbers as a member.

Many Tory Lawyers Sided.
In 1911 the sum of \$1,200 was paid to several legal gentlemen who are known as good Conservatives and supporters of the government. These were: J. L. Hannington, of Gloucester; C. Lionel Hannington, in Westmorland county; A. A. Wilson, of St. John; the late W. Albert Mott, of Restigouche; John B. M. Baxter, of St. John; C. J. Coster and H. A. Powell, of the same city; T. J. Carter, of Victoria, and now a government candidate in that county; H. H. James, of Kent; J. C. Hartley, of Charlottetown; A. A. Davidson, in Westmorland; Fowler & Jones, Kings; George Gilbert, of Gloucester; R. B. Hanson, of York; and E. C. Weyman, of Kings.

The legal expenses this year for fish, forest and game were \$311.15, all of which was outside the attorney general's department. Hon. Mr. Hazen, in 1911, had \$412 for travelling expenses, \$600 for a special stenographer, and \$2,000 for his secretary. In connection with the coronation ceremonies; \$48.60 for a stenographer in London, and \$1,000, while under the heading of succession duties, he was paid the sum of \$277.80.

The solicitor general in the same year received, in addition to his salary of \$12,000, \$215 for travelling expenses and \$171.00 for contingencies.

All of the above goes to show that the members of the Hazen-Fleming government did not live up to the promise that they made in opposition. They were always harping upon the expenditures of the then attorney general, Dr. Poirer, and one of their favorite campaign speeches consisted of additions of the amounts that he had received, for a good many years previously in order that the people might be convinced that the government, of which he was a member, was lavish in its distribution of favors. No sooner, however, had Mr. Hazen come into power than he placed his friend, H. A. Powell in a position to charge the province over \$2,000 for his services in connection with the useless Central Railway investigation, and various other persons, including a judge of the supreme court, received over \$5,000 in connection with the same inquiry.

EXCHEQUER COURT AWARDS

Judgment in Several Cases Which Were Heard in Chatham

Chatham, N. B., May 20.—Today the exchequer court was occupied until about 5 o'clock with the crown end of the A. & R. Logan case. Six witnesses were examined during the day, these were A. P. Williams, W. Scott, H. C. Reid, value-taxes, W. B. Loggie, M. P., Benjamin Flood and John C. Fowle, town treasurer. When these had been heard the judge intimated that he did not need the counsel to review the case pro and con, as he had a very good idea of the evidence fresh in his mind and he would give his decision in the course of a short time. Dr. Wallace, for the defence, and R. A. Lawlor, for the crown, thereupon let the case stand.

His lordship then delivered judgment on four of the cases that had come before him. P. H. Loggie gets \$2,080. He said that the award of \$200 was obviously inadequate as shown by the evidence of several witnesses and he gave judgment for \$2,080 and interest from the date of expropriation and he allowed costs of \$175. Judge Wilkinson gets \$332. His lordship said that taking into account that some of the judge's best land in the centre of his farm had been taken he would give judgment for \$332 and allow costs of \$130. Sheriff O'Brien, \$150. The judge declared that in the O'Brien case he could not take the value that the defendant put upon his land, as it was but a medium grade of farm land taken and he felt that the case should not have been brought before the court. He gave judgment for \$150 and would allow no costs.

Geo. E. Fisher gets \$1,815 in his case.

The judge allowed \$400 for the land taken; \$1,000 for damages to the farm and \$250 for all other incidental damages, making \$1,650, which with 10 per cent for interest or being foreclosed taken, made \$1,815. MR. COPP'S SPEECH

(Frederickton Mail.)
The speech of A. B. Copp, M. P. P., at the King's County Liberal convention was one of the most important he has delivered since he took over the leadership of the party. It shows that he has been giving serious attention to the great problems which confront New Brunswick and is prepared to grapple with them in a firm and business-like manner.

Mr. Copp in his speech made two proposals which if carried out will undoubtedly improve conditions in the rural sections of the province, and for this reason should receive the hearty support of the farmers. He proposes to assist the farmers by long term leases upon the rural telephone service at low rate of interest and on easy terms of repayment, and he also proposes to give an improved rural telephone service at a reduced cost. These proposals, if carried out of the they will be carried out by the election of the

province put Mr. Copp and his friends into power—will add to the attractiveness of life on the farm, keep our young people at home, and consequently be of untold benefit to the province.

Mr. Copp's plan is as far ahead of Premier Fleming's ready-made farm scheme as day is ahead of night. Mr. Fleming proposes to bring in outsiders, provide them with farms, and assist them to operate the same. Mr. Copp proposes a plan to encourage and assist our farmers by making it possible for them to obtain cheaper money in order to increase the output of their farms. The money will not be absorbed by salaried officials, but will go directly to the farmer. Mr. Copp realizes that the farmer, that agriculture is the backbone of New Brunswick, and if it is established on a firm basis, all other interests must share in the benefits. His proposal is an intensely practical one and will appeal to the great majority of those who have the real interests of the province at heart.

UPPER ST. JOHN DRIVES OUT

Frederickton, May 20.—That all the drives on the Upper St. John River have been brought out was the statement made today by E. Chouinard, of St. Pamphile with Mrs. Chouinard, was at the Barker House over Sunday.

Mr. and Mrs. Chouinard left this morning for St. John and before leaving Mr. Chouinard said that the last of the drives had been brought out the latter part of last week. The total amount of lumber to come from the Upper St. John this year to the booms here amounts to about 30,000,000 feet, of which about 60,000,000 feet is now said to be in the booms; there is also between 20,000,000 and 30,000,000 feet for the St. John Lumber Company and other mills in Maine above the Grand Falls.

Mr. Chouinard is the largest operator, having about 13,000,000 feet of new lumber and 10,000,000 of old logs, a total of 23,000,000 feet, of which 15,000,000 are coming to the booms here.

The total amount of old and new logs coming to the St. John River Log Driving Company's booms for the mills here and at St. John, is made up as follows:
