

## WAS MIDSHIPMAN AT ALMA BATTLE

Colonel W. N. Tufnell Dead  
in England at the Age of  
Eighty-four.

London, Nov. 6.—(By Mail).—Col. William Nevill Tufnell, J. P., D. L., of Langley, Great Waltham, Essex, who died last week, aged 84, was one of the last surviving officers who served in the Crimean War. From Cheam he entered the Royal Navy in 1853, joining the Britannia, flagship of Admiral Sir D. Dundas, and serving in her and in H. M. S. Niger throughout the war. As a midshipman he was present at the landing of the Allied Armies in the Crimea; at the Battle of Alma, his ship covered the French right advance by hauling close in shore, and playing on the enemy's left with her sixty-eight pounder guns. He took part in the bombardment of Sevastopol, and afterwards saw all the grim work with the Naval Brigade in the trenches of Bal-

clava, and also during the Battle of Inkerman. He served in the Boxer, gunboat, in the Sea of Azov, and was present at the loss of the frigate Tiger, off Odessa. One of his intimate associates at this period, with whom he shared his tent in the trenches, was Midshipman Evelyn Wood, afterwards Field-Marshal Sir Evelyn Wood, V. C. After further service against slaves on the East Coast of Africa, Tufnell retired from the Navy in 1884, and joined the Volunteers. He commanded the 2nd V. B. Essex Regiment between 1871 and 1889, and was a member of the Essex Territorial Force Association till 1917. Few can show so long a record of service to the State as Colonel Tufnell, who served in one capacity or another for sixty-five years. Till 1917 the monthly "Army List" contained the names of two officers only who served in the Crimean War, signified by the letter "C" against their names; these were Sir Evelyn Wood and Colonel Tufnell.

The Tufnells are an old Essex family who have given many sons to the services, including Admiral L. G. Tufnell, C. M. G., Col. Tufnell, J. P., D. L., was a son of John Wolfe Tufnell, J. P., D. L., on whose death in 1894 he succeeded to Langley. He was a local director of Barclays Bank, and was interested in country sports as well as

**27 BLOOD TRANSFUSIONS FAIL.**

Southampton, N. Y., Dec. 6.—Twenty-seven blood transfusions, administered during the last two years, failed to save the life of Mrs. Adelaide E. Jones of Shelter Island, who died in Southampton Hospital of pernicious anemia. Mrs. Jones was 57 years old.

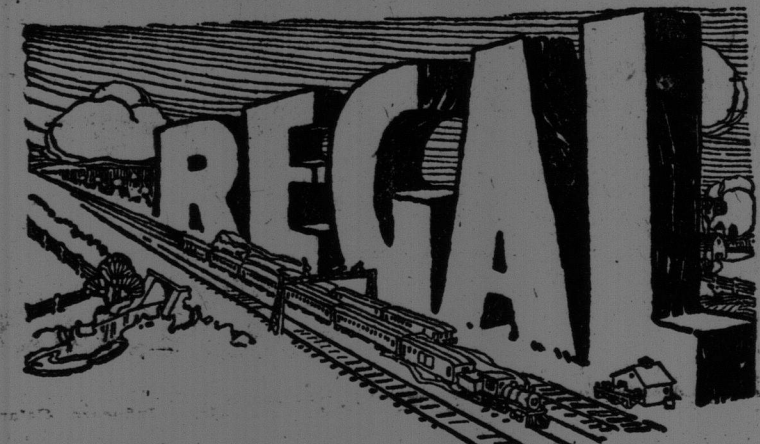

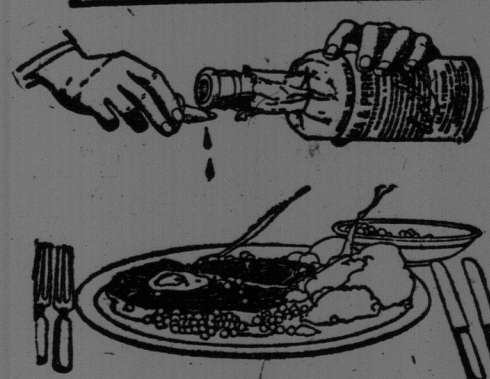

Fra Angelico's Picture of Virgin and Child Lost.

Rome, Nov. 6.—(By Mail).—The priceless picture of the Virgin and Child, by Fra Angelico, signed and dated 1443, has been stolen from the Oratory of the St. Sebastian annex of the Church of St. Felix, at Florence. The discovery of the loss was made when the church was opened in the morning, and all efforts to trace the thieves, or discover how the theft was effected, have been unsuccessful. The picture, which has never left its position since the erection of the church in 1608, was one of the most valuable art treasures of Florence.

## DRIVERS SHOOT EACH OTHER

One Motorist is Dead, Another Dying, After Road Quarrel.

Buffalo, N. Y., Dec. 6.—A quarrel between motorists over right of way on

a road near the city line is said by witnesses to be the sole reason for a double shooting in which one of the victims was killed and the other probably mortally wounded.

The dead man is Ralph H. Hahn, Joseph J. Tucholski, a sergeant of police on the New York Central Railroad's force, is in a hospital with a bullet in his abdomen. A Deputy Sheriff is on guard at his bedside.

The version of the shooting given by girls, who were in Tucholski's machine, is that Hahn's machine was blocking the road and that he refused to make way when Tucholski drove up. A wordy quarrel ensued and then both men drew revolvers and began to shoot. Hahn died at the wheel of his machine with four bullets in his body. Tucholski fell with a bullet in his abdomen.
