thence along the same, south two degrees west, six chains and seventy-four links to an ash tree standing in the southeasterly angle thereof; thence along the easterly line thereof, north two degrees east, twenty-eight chains, (crossing the line mentioned brook to a hemlock tree, or to a birch tree standing in the southeasterly angle thereof, north two degrees east, twenty-eight chains, (crossing the line mentioned brook, and the second Digdig Lake) or to a maple tree standing on the westerly line of lot A, granted to John Porter; thence along the same, south two degrees west, six chains and seventy-four links to an ash tree standing in the southeasterly angle thereof; thence along the easterly line thereof, north two degrees east, twenty-eight chains, (crossing the line mentioned brook to a hemlock tree, or to a birch tree standing in the southeasterly angle thereof, north two degrees east, twenty-eight chains, (crossing the line mentioned brook, and the second Digdig Lake) or to a maple tree standing on the westerly line of lot A, granted to John Porter; thence along the same, south two degrees west, six chains and seventy-four links to an ash tree standing in the southeasterly angle thereof; thence along the easterly line thereof, north two degrees east, twenty-eight chains, (crossing the line mentioned brook to a hemlock tree, or to a birch tree standing in the southeasterly angle thereof, north two degrees east, twenty-eight chains, (crossing the line mentioned brook, and the second Digdig Lake) or to a maple tree standing on the westerly line of lot A, granted to John Porter; thence along the same, south two degrees west, six chains and seventy-four links to an ash tree standing in the southeasterly angle thereof; thence along the easterly line thereof, north two degrees east, twenty-eight chains, (crossing the line mentioned brook to a hemlock tree, or to a birch tree standing in the southeasterly angle thereof, north two degrees east, twenty
