BANGOR, April 29.

IMPORTANT AND SIGNIFICANT ANNOUNCEMENT.—The Washington Star of the 27th has the following:—

"As the time is approaching when some of the regiments belonging to Army of the Potomac are to be discharged from the military service of the United States, by reason of the expiration of the term for which they were mustered into said service, Major Gen. Meade has announced to such troops that the War Department has decided that the term of service of each regiment is to be computed from the date of its muster into the service of the United States without reference to the date of enlistment, or any service rendered to a State."

The Commanding General, in making this announcement, expresses a hope that the regiments to be discharged will cheerfully acquiesce in the decision of the Government with regard to their term of service, and that organized bodies or individuals, after having borne an unequalled reputation during all the eventful scenes which have marked their connection with the Army of the Potomac, will not suffer the honorable fame they have won by their gallantry and good conduct to be tarnished in the closing hours of their service by acts of insubordination, which, if ventured on, will be promptly suppressed, and can only terminate in the speedy and certain punishment of the offending parties."

FEDERAL ENLISTMENTS IN HALIFAX.—It is pretty well understood that there are at present in our city, and in other parts of the Province, numerous agents of the Federal Government engaged in endeavouring to decoy young men to the United States by the allurements of employment at high wages when they reach there; when in fact the primary object in view is the prospect of their enlistment in the army, in which design they too often succeed.

On Tuesday, the Provincial Secretary laid on the table of the Assembly a despatch from Lord Lyons, stating that the British Consul in Boston had apprised him that a project was on foot in city to obtain recruits from the Provinces under a pretext of engaging them to work in a patent brick manufactory.

THE SUGAR REFINERY which has been in course of erection and fitting up for the last six months, is now completed and ready to commence operations. On Wednesday afternoon a large number of gentlemen were present by invitation of the manager, Mr. Duxton, and were shown through the premises by the intelligent superintendent, Mr. Williams, who explained the use of the various and complicated machinery with which the building is filled. The greater part of all this machinery has been made in the City, principally by Messrs. Fleming & Humbert and James Harris, and gives the utmost satisfaction to the Managers, who speak in the highest terms of the workmanship of our mechanics. In a short time we shall probably see a specimen of the sugar turned out of these works, and we have no doubt that it will be of such a quality and price as to take the place of the imported article.

EUROPEAN INTELLIGENCE.

Arrival of the "Europa."

HALIFAX, April 30.
Europa, Heckley, left Liverpool at 3 p. m. 16th, Queenstown 17th, arrived at Halifax 3 a. m. 30th, 58 Halifax and 88 Boston passengers. GARIBALDI'S RECEPTION IN LONDON.

The General had a magnificent reception in the Crystal Palace yesterday from 25 to 30,000 persons were present, including a large number of the Aristocracy and Members of both Houses of Parliament and of the legal, scientific and literary professions.

Italian Committee took the most prominent part in the proceedings of the day. A flag of Italy was presented to Garibaldi bearing the words "Rome and Venice." The General addressed the Representatives of the Italian working men with an animation and eloquence which contrasted remarkably with the few simple phrases of his previous address. The Italian Concert then followed, the chorus of the Garibaldi Hymn was sung with great fervor, after the Concert the sword offered by the Italians of London was presented. Garibaldi in accepting the sword said, I thank you Italians for this beautiful present, I promise you I will never unseath it in the cause of tyranny, and will draw it only in support of oppressed nationalities. I hope yet to carry it with me to Rome and Venice. The proceedings were marked by a great display of enthusiasm.

TREATMENT OF WOMEN IN AUSTRIAN POLAND.

A letter from Lemberg (Galicia), in the Presse of Vienna, says:—Since the beginning of the month the military tribunals in this province have been actively occupied. They try on an average four cases a day. A certain number of persons have been condemned to corporal punishment for various offences, particularly for having insulted sentinels while on duty. Several individuals have been bastinadoed or whipped for that misdemeanour, among them two women—Julia Chorostowska, a dressmaker, aged thirty-four, who received ten lashes, Catherine Samborska, a servant aged twenty, who had a similar punishment. A great number of persons have been condemned to imprisonment for one month or four.

Orders of Sessions.

(Continued from last week.)

APRIL GEN. SESSIONS, 1864.

Ordered.—That Justices Jas. Murchie, J. H. Maxwell, and G. B. Alward, be a committee to receive and disburse the amount assessed for the erection of an Almshouse in the Parish of St. Stephen, they being the building committee appointed to superintend the same.

Ordered.—That the Parish of St. George be assessed forty dollars to build a Pound in said Parish, and that Timothy Riordan, Robert Thomson and Claudius Messenett, Esqrs., to have the said pound built.

Ordered.—That the recently appointed County Treasurer be required forthwith to furnish the Bond required by law for the approval of the Justices, and that the amount of said Bond be the sum of four thousand dollars, and that the said officer be immediately furnished with a copy of the order.

Ordered.—That the prayer of the petition of Thos. Alexander just read be complied with.

Ordered.—That the rent of land occupied by John Short of Chamcook be reduced to \$4, in accordance with his memorial.

Ordered.—That Samuel McDonald's rent be reduced to thirty cents per acre.

Ordered.—That the rents of Hugh Craig and John Craig be reduced to twenty cents per acre.

Ordered.—That there be a judgment against James Kelly at the suit of the Justices, for rent of School land, for ten dollars; and whereas it appears to the Justices, the said James Kelly has no money to pay the said sum of ten dollars.—Ordered, That James Kelly be discharged in the said suit.

Ordered.—That all river pilots whose names appear in the St. George Parish list, be erased therefrom.

Ordered.—That Rules of Order be suspended to admit of application for Wholesale Licence from Robert Burns.

Ordered.—That said Robert Burns receive such license for Indian Island in this County.

Ordered.—That Andrew Elliott, constable in the suit of the Justices on the lease with James Kelly, be paid his costs out of the funds of the town of St. Andrews.

Whereas St. Andrew's Session duly convened at the office of the Clerk of the Peace in St. Andrews, on the 5th of October last, to consider the application of Owen Jones, for a lease of a certain portion of the waters of the lower Chamcook lake, and also for a lease of a small portion of what is known as the "Fairly lot" of the School lands in Chamcook, and whereas the applications of the said Owen Jones were then complied with, and leases were then granted him under certain rents and reservations, be it therefore Ordered.—That all matters and things due at the said Special Sessions as aforesaid, be confirmed by the Court.

Ordered.—That Henry Boyd be required to comply with the terms of sale, in reference to the lot of School land bought by him.

Ordered.—That all Parish lands except that of St. Andrews, which are not yet confirmed, be now confirmed.

Ordered.—That the Report of Harbour Master of St. Andrews be accepted, and put on file.

Ordered.—That the town of St. Andrews be assessed in the sum of \$300 for the purposes of the Fire Department of said town.

Ordered.—That Justices J. W. Street, A. W. Smith, and B. R. Fitzgerald, be the Gaol committee for the ensuing year.

Ordered.—That Justices A. W. Smith, B. R. Fitzgerald and Wm. Whitlock, be a committee to manage the property of the town of St. Andrews, the ensuing year.

Ordered.—That James Moran, overseer of the poor, pay to Claudius Messenett, Esq., ten dollars and fifty cents.

Ordered.—That the Market Wharf in the town of St. Andrews, including the burnt distillery, be let at Auction, on Tuesday next, to the highest bidder, at the hour of 11 A. M., for the term of 12 months, from the end of the present lease thereof.

Ordered.—That the several Parishes of the County be assessed in the following sums for the support of the Poor this year:—

Ordered.—That W. J. Magee and Neil McNeill be surveyors of lumber for the Parish of St. George.

Ordered.—That no vessel pay river pilotage for the Port of St. George, unless a river pilot is employed by the master, who must pay him according to the present rates.

Ordered.—That the Collector of Rates in and for the Parish of St. Andrews, be required to give security for the faithful discharge of his duty, in the sum of \$1,000 by Bond to the Crown, with two good and sufficient securities.

Ordered.—That the late Overseers of the Poor of the Parish of St. Andrews, hand over to the Secretary of the Commissioners of the Poorhouse, in said Parish for the present year, all books, papers, and monies, appertaining to the Poorhouse in this Parish.

Ordered.—That this Court approve of Wm. Whitlock and Harris H. Hatch, Esqrs., as surtens for the County Treasurer.

Ordered.—That the Commissioners for superintending and managing the Poorhouse in the Parish of St. Andrews, let by tender the medical attendance and medicine required for the use of the indoor and outdoor paupers of the said Parish for the ensuing year.

Ordered.—Whereas the Market Wharf in the Parish of St. Andrews was yesterday, 20th April, let at public auction for the ensuing year, there being no order that the rates of wharfage for the said wharf, be those passed at the April Sessions, 1861, and be continued until otherwise ordered.

Ordered.—That Jeremiah Hayman be excused from payment of the fine imposed for non-attendance as a Grand Juror at the present session of this Court.

Ordered.—That the Commissioners of the Poor

house for the Parish of St. Andrews do furnish at the April Sessions in each and every year, 1st—a statement as detailed as practicable of the stock and other property on the farm attached to the Poorhouse, and the value of the same as near as may be. 2d, a statement as near as can be, and as detailed as practicable of the quantity and value of the farm produce during the preceding year and how disposed of. 3d, a statement showing the amount expended in repairs and improvements upon the farmhouse and buildings thereon. 4th, a statement of the amount expended for outdoor relief; also the cost of each pauper per week.

Ordered.—That an order made and passed at the present Session, fixing the percentage for collecting the Dog taxes at 12 1/2 per cent be rescinded, and further Ordered.—That 20 per cent be paid the Collector of Dog taxes, on all sums collected and paid in by him.

Ordered.—That the Clerk of the Peace be authorized to collect all sums arising from the property of the town of St. Andrews, and further ordered that he submit a detailed account of the receipts and disbursements of the said monies to the Grand Jury and the Justices, at the April Sessions in each and every year, receiving therefor the usual commission received by the late Clerk.

Whereas Justices Boyd and Whitlock were appointed a committee to make such arrangements with the St. Croix Steamboat Company as to the terms, &c., on which the lease should be renewed to them of the Steamboat Wharf, should they require it, and report thereof, and whereas no report has been made so far as the Court are aware, therefore Ordered.—That the said Justices Boyd and Whitlock be continued as such committee as aforesaid, and that they report their doings at the next September Sessions, and further Ordered.—That the said Justices Boyd and Whitlock be a committee of the said Wharf, for all other purposes.

Ordered.—That the Commissioners of the Poorhouse in the Parish of St. Andrews pay Andrew Elliott the sum of \$8 for services done the Parish.

Ordered.—That the following goods, viz:—four and meal, meat, whether fresh or salted, dry and pickled fish, groceries, dry goods, boots and shoes, and all other articles of whatsoever nature or kind for the use of the indoor and outdoor paupers, in the Parish of St. Andrews, be procured by the Commissioners for the superintending and managing the Poorhouse in said Parish, by public competition; and further

Ordered.—That no person being a Commissioner as aforesaid shall be a competitor for any of the articles required for the use of the said paupers.

Whereas there is a balance of \$175.41 due Thos. Algar, Ordered.—That the sum of \$24.04 be paid him out of the funds of the town of St. Andrews, and the balance of \$25.50 be paid him by the Commissioners of the Poorhouse in said Parish, out of the Parish funds.

Ordered.—That the prayer of the petition of Albert Moberly be not complied with.

Ordered.—That the Collectors of St. James receive the four taxes of that Parish, in American money without discount.

Ordered.—That recognizances under the Act relating to spirituous liquors may be taken from applicants in remote situations, day and before a Justice of the Peace at the expense of the applicant.

Ordered.—That the County Treasurer pay to the Administrators of the estate of the late Wellington Hatch, Esq., the sum of \$20 for services done for the county.

Ordered.—That the Commissioners for superintending and managing the Poorhouse in the Parish of St. Andrews, pay the Administrators of the estate of the late Wellington Hatch, Esq., the sum of \$11.35, for services done for the Parish.

Whereas the Grand Jury recommended that the well on what is known as the "Carrick property" in the town of St. Andrews, be covered over, therefore Ordered.—That the owners of the property do cover over the said well, else it will at the next Sessions be declared a nuisance.

Ordered.—That the building known as the Town Hall in St. Andrews be leased for one year from the 1st May next, reserving the use of the same for public meetings, and on condition that no spirituous liquor be retailed therein.

Ordered.—That the bill of \$11.35, of W. Whitlock, Esq., be paid out of the funds of town of St. Andrews.

Ordered.—That, in the opinion of the Court, Janet Carmichael's claim for pension, as the widow of an old soldier, should be allowed and paid.

Ordered.—That that ram lambs be taken by the 10th day of September in each year, and not allowed to run at large in the Parish of Grand Maroon before the 10th day of December, under a penalty of \$20.

Ordered.—That all ram lambs found running at large in said Parish between the 10th of September and 10th of December in any one year, shall be taken up by any person, and not being marked, shall, after being advertised five days be sold, and the proceeds after deducting expenses of taking up, shall be paid to the Overseers of the Poor of said Parish.

Ordered.—That the Commissioners for superintending and managing the Poorhouse in the Parish of St. Andrews, pay Michael Cronan the sum of \$2.50 in full for ringing the bell for the Parish meetings, for the last 5 years to date.

Mr. Claudius Messenett, as already stated, will also offer—so that there will be four persons on the election course this summer—three of whom will positively be distanced without doubt. Betting will not be very great, as the odds are so apparent as to leave no margin for doubt.

C. C. Grammar School.

According to the "Rules and Regulations" of the Board of Education, the Semi-annual Examination of the Grammar School was held in the presence of the President and Directors, on the 24th inst., being the first Monday in May.

The subjects submitted for examination comprised Latin, Greek, French, Euclid and Roman History. Algebra, English Grammar, Geography, &c.

The Board unanimously agreed that the Examination was very satisfactory.

The President commended the pupils for the good examination which they had passed, and the decided improvement manifested since Christmas. He told them to use their influence with their parents, to allow them to partake of all the benefits of the Grammar School, by studying the higher branches such as Greek, Latin, French, Mathematics.

That it matters not for what business or profession they were intended, the study of these subjects was very beneficial; the very act of studying them improved and strengthened the mind. He also praised their writing, as being generally very good indeed.

The proceedings were closed by prayer. The holidays will take place, as usual, in Midsummer.—Com.

—The St. John river is now clear of ice, and the steamers are again running between St. John and Fredericton; the freight was sufficiently high to permit of driving the logs in the streams.

—A very destructive fire occurred in DeMarara on the 3rd inst., which consumed many buildings and much valuable property. Owing to a scarcity of water, they were obliged to blow up many houses with gunpowder in order to stop the conflagration.

—The loss estimated at two and a half millions of dollars.

—The Editor of the News has been presented with a very fine specimen of gold-bearing quartz, said to have been obtained in the neighborhood of Mount Robinson, about 21 miles up the St. John River. It can be seen at his auction and is worth examination, as it appears to be a rich specimen.

PUNISHMENT IN THE FEDERAL ARMY.—There is reported to the punishment called "tying up."
