The writer quotes the president of such questions as intervention in the Turco-Italian war, on America's attitude in regard to China, on the situation in Morocco and on the subject of arbitration.

When asked about the possibilities of American mediation in the Turco Italian war, the writer says President Taft declared that the United States was certainly disposed in favor of the restoration of peace. Nevertheless, he felt that it would be unwise to depart from the path of wisdom.




