### AN ALAN LINE RUMOR.

AN ALAN LINE RUMOR.

It is stated in Liverpool that, owing to the strained relations between the Allan Company, of Liverpool, and the Mersey Dook Board, a portion of the shipping company's tonange, dealing with cargo running to St. John's (New-foundland), Halifax, and Philadelphia, may be diverted to Manchester. This tonnage also includes what is known as the City Line, which runs to the east, and which, owing to the inadequate depth of water, finds difficulty in ontering Morpéth Dock, Birkenhead, Much cargo for the lines named comes from Manchester, and Messrs. Allan a complain, according to the Liverpool Journal of Commerce, that their trade is scattered. Mail steamers have to load in Canada Branch Dock, American cargo boats in Alexandra Dock, two miles away, whilst steamers to the east are inadequately accommodated at Birkenhead.—Canadian Gazette.
