WILL SINK A MONITOR TO TEST A TORPEDO

WASHINGTON, May 28.—The next of the destructive tests to be made up on the monitor Florida is fixed for June 10. On that date the Florida will be brought from the Norfolk navy yard to a suitable spot in Hampton Roads, where the depth of water probably will not exceed 20 or 25 feet and there will be attacked by an American Whitehead torpedo, which will be directed against a spot on the hull about six or eight feet below the waterline, inside of which will be located a special form of bulkhead, which probably will carry a bursting charge of 20 pounds of gun cotton and it is expected to sink the Florida at the first attempt. The vessel will easily be raised owing to the shallow depth of water.

PRESBYTERIANS DEAL WITH SOCIAL QUESTION

ARRANGING TO SEARCH FOR MISSING STEAMER

NEW YORK, May 28.—Counsel for the National Association of Manufacturers announced today that the organization had taken up the case of the missing steamer Goldsboro, and that at a meeting of the association to be held tomorrow means for locating that vessel and F. G. Bailey, president of the Export Shipping Company, supposed to be on board her, would be discussed. The Goldsboro sailed from this port May 2 under charter by the Export Shipping Company, since positioned to bankruptcy, and has not since been heard from. She departed under British registry with a valuable cargo, bound for Honduras ports, but soon after her sailing her charter was revoked by the British authorities. A. Parker Nevins, counsel for the National Manufacturers' Association, said tonight that some members of the association have declared their willingness to finance the sending out of a special steamer for the finding of the Goldsboro.

CHICAGO POLITICAN IS DANGEROUSLY ILL

CHICAGO, May 28.—John P. Finerty, one of Chicago's foremost Irish citizens, is dangerously ill. He has been confined to his residence since December of last year. Several times his life has been despaired of, but each time he has rallied. During the last few days, however, he has been failing rapidly. Mr. Finerty was elected to Congress from Chicago in 1882. He is an orator and a writer as well as a politician. He saw service not only in the Civil war, but in two Fenian raids in Canada, and under General Allison in the campaign against the Sioux Indians.

WILL DISCUSS PRIZE CONVENTIONS

LONDON, May 28.—Answering a question in the House of Commons today, Foreign Secretary Sir Edward Grey said that the British Government desired to concentrate the discussion at the forthcoming naval conference upon the prize court conventions. It was essential, he said, that Great Britain have some agreement upon certain points, especially the rules governing blockades and contraband of war, with the chief naval power before the convention meets.
