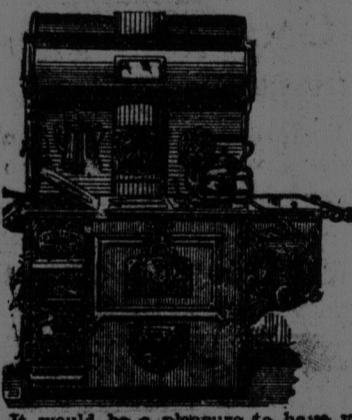

P. E. ISLAND WANTS ALL
THAT IS COMING TO IT

Delegation Will Go to Ottawa
Looking for Many Millions
from Federal Treasury in
Settlement of Old Claims.

CHARLOTTETOWN, P. E. I., April 5.—Before the Dominion Parliament closes, there will wait upon the Federal cabinet a delegation from the P. E. Island Government, to submit and press certain claims which this province has upon the Dominion. This delegation will be headed by Premier Haszard, who will be accompanied probably by Hon. Geo. E. Hughes, Mr. John Agnew and others who constitute the committee which was appointed in the house last session to prepare a statement. Just before the house adjourned last week, Premier Haszard submitted a report of the committee. Their work was not completed up to that time the claims so far as considered were as follows:

1. The Island's share in the Halifax Fishery Award, estimated at \$1,250,000 with accrued interest. The award has arisen before Confederation, the Dominion Government claimed to hold it as trustee for the province affected, and the sum was recognized by the net interest is distributed in bounties, but the lion's share has been secured by Nova Scotia. The fishery award claim has now been before the provincial legislature for a number of years. Some members are urging that this province should unite with others interested, and thus, acting on the principle that union is strength, succeed in receiving the Dominion share. Others contend that as the island's case is different from that of the other provinces and as the bulk of the evidence on which the award was made was taken from the island, where the greatest catches were made by the Americans, this province should press its claim itself. However, both parties in the house are agreed that we have a strong and valid claim.

PLAN MONUMENT FOR
PARTRIDGE ISLAND

Where Thousands of Irish
Immigrants Lie Buried
Local Society to Perpetuate Memory of
Plague Victims—Will Send Big
Delegation to Quebec.

It is the intention of the local Order of Hibernians to erect a monument on Partridge Island in memory of the large numbers of Irishmen buried there. The plans are now advancing and several members are actively engaged in the matter. There are said to be between 3,000 and 4,000 Irish immigrants buried at the island. These people came to Canada in small vessels in 1847, the year of the great famine. Fever soon overtook them and they were stricken down by the hundreds. A few years ago a movement was started to erect a monument at the island, but the arrangements were not completed. Plans had been drawn for the structure and are still in the possession of the architect. The provincial secretary of the order is furthering the project, and Partridge Island may soon be graced with a handsome monument.
