Friedburg Bank As Confederate Exploded Bomb In City Hall-Overtaken By Auto.

Friedberg Hesse, June 22.—A desperate attempt at robbery, which occurred here late today, resulted in two deaths and the wounding of several persons.

A bomb was exploded at about half past four o'clock in the city hall. In the meantime a black-masked robber entered the adjoining branch of the Imperial Bank and attacked the manager who resisted. The robber then

Imperial Bank and attacked the manager who resisted. The robber then drew a revolver and shot the manager in the neck. He selzed a quantity of bank notes and some gold, and fied.

Having gained the street he mounted a bicycle and dashed off. A great crowd, attracted by the explosion, pursued the desperado who fired repeatedly. One boy was killed and two others were wounded. The police jumped into an automobile and sped after the man, finally overtaking him when he fired his last shot into his temple, falling dead in the street. He was recognized as a chauffeur named Barkenstein.

Mrs. Geo. Patterson, Slightly Burned In Midnight Fire, Passed Away Yesterday-Electrical Storm Damges.

Moncton, June 22.—Mrs. George Patterson in whose house fire occurred last night, died this afternoon. She was elightly burned in assisting to extinguish the fiames. Her injuries were not necessarily fatal and death is supposed to have been due to excitement and shock.

A terrific storm passed over the city this afternoon about four o'clock and two inches of rain fell in three quarters of an inch and streets were flooded in some places nearly one foot deep. Sewers proved unable to carry off the water.

New York, N. Y., June 22.—Theodore Roosevelt has asked Governor Hughes to visit him at Sagamore Hill, in the near future, for a conference. The news came out this afternoon, during a brief supplementary statement. Mr. Roosevelt chose to add to his dental this morning of a printed report that he is to come out in opposition to the government's policy of direct primaries.

Mr. Roosevelt did not say he had received the governor's acceptance, and he refused to give any hint of what subjects he expected to come up in conference.

But taken as part of a conversation which had to do with direct primaries, the mere announcement aroused the keenest speculation.

Tonight Col. Roosevelt was the guest of Robert Collier at a private dinner at Sherry's. No list of guests was given out and no reporters were admitted. He will remain in New York tonight and be at his desk tomorrow morning, returning to Oyster Bay late in the afternoon.

HEAVY FINES FOR MINING SHARKS

Toronto, June 22.—Dr. John E. Wil-inson, manager of the Wilkinson melting Company, found guilty of naking unregistered purchases of ore was sentenced by Judge Winchester, was sentenced by Judge Winchester, in the sessions this morning, being fined \$300 or six months' imprisonment. Cobalt miners charged with making illegal sales of ore to Wilkinson, were dealt with as follows:

J. F. Parr, alias Connelly, and Alec Littlejohn, alias McFarland, fined \$200 each, or six months' imprisonment, H. A. Vanwick, \$100 or three months Wm. Johnson, alias J. A. Kill, \$25 or sixty days; Geo, Barber, the Cobalt hotel keeper, who carried his case to the court of appeals and lost, was fined \$200 or six months. The men were convicted last March, but sentences were deferred pending Barber's appeal, Today they all pleaded guilty.

WILL REFUSE TO ACCEPT AWARD

New York, June 22.—The stanch Norwegian bark Crown, which sailed from Nova Scotia with a cargo of lumber on December 11 last year for Bahia Blanca, off the eastern coast of Argentina, and was abandoned waterlogged in January, was sighted on Friday about 240 miles southwest of Bermuda by the Lamport and Holt liner Titian in yesterday from Brazilian ports. Her masts and bowsprit and jibboom were standing and a reefed upper maintopsail were set, although she doubtless has zigzagged through many storms in the last five mouths. She looked so much like a vessel under command that Capt. Carry sent a boat's crew to her. They found no one aboard and returned to the liner. She may be heard from later near enough to an American port to inspire the derelict destroyer and salver Seneca to see whether she is worth towing into harbor.

L. V. R. IS DOUBLED

\$80,000,000 Will Be The New Issue By Prosperous Pennsylvania Road - Directors

Philadelphia, June 22.—The stock-holders of the Lehigh Valley Railroad Company at a special meeting here today voted to increase the capital stock of the company from \$40,334,800 to \$80,000,000.

The directors were empowered to issue and dispose of as many of the additional shares of the stock as they think necessary for railroad purposes. The directors authorized an issue of \$20,220,550 to which holders of common and preferred stock can subscribe at par in amounts of 50 per cent of their holdings as they stand registered on June 30.
