

Noted Gang Leader Is Sent to Sing Sing

"Dopey Benny", Head of New York East Side Band of Gunmen Convicted for Assaulting Policemen — Police Guard Judge During Passage of Sentence.

New York, Jan. 26.—With extraordinary precautions taken to protect himself and the court attendants from the score of "gunmen" in the corridor outside, Judge Malone, in the Court of General Sessions, on Friday, sentenced "Dopey Benny" Fein, notorious head of the east side band which bears his name, to five years in Sing Sing for the offence of which he was convicted. Fein was convicted of assaulting Police Sergeant Patrick Sheridan.

Long before court opened rowdy youths were pacing the corridors. Several were recognized as men with prison records, and all were of the type which made the "Dopey Bennys" the terror of east side merchants and residents. Half an hour before court opened detectives drove all whom they recognized as "bad men" to the street. Policemen were marshalled about the door to the court room and stood guard.

Judge Malone walked from the elevator to the court room escorted by three officers in place of the one who usually accompanies him. Just after Judge Malone entered the room several youths at the door demanded admission. They declared that they were law students, but their appearance was decidedly against them. They became insolent in their demands and finally were driven from the building.

Called for sentence, "Dopey Benny" gave his name as Benjamin Fein, 27 years old, laborer, of No. 102 Forsyth street. His record showed that he was sentenced to Elmira Reformatory once had served a term in Sing Sing and had once been fined for disorderly conduct. Charles Wahle, who defended Fein, moved to set aside the verdict on the ground that there had been prejudice. The judge refused, and Mr. Wahle announced that he would appeal.

Asked if he had anything to say before being sentenced, "Dopey Benny" declared that he was innocent and that he had been "framed" by the police. His voice was plainly audible to those in the corridor and it was evident that "Dopey Benny" wanted his friends to know that he was "game."

"I am ready to go to prison," he said, "but I am innocent. As sure as there is a God Almighty, I am innocent. I have been hounded by the police. I was out on \$7,000 bail for seven months and could have run away if I wanted to, but I was innocent and did not fear the consequences of the trial. The police know that I am innocent. I was beaten up, disfigured and a gun planted in my pocket. Every one knows I was framed, but I am ready to take my medicine."

Judge Malone then pronounced sentence. Following the sentence Malone received the following letter from him in the Tombs by "Dopey Benny":

"As early as last July it was an open rumor in police circles, which eventually came to my ears through ordinary channels, that I was to be framed before long. For that reason I took particular care not to have any disputes of any kind, even at times when it seemed as though they were trying to lead me into a trap. Since my return from Sing Sing prison I have been trying my best to be a good boy and avoid trouble, but the police would not have it that way. I am not without heart. I am human, even though the police would lead people to believe otherwise. They presented me with a handle to frame me, and help to ally suspicion in the minds of the public regarding the capabilities of the police department."

A bench warrant was lodged with the Warden of Sing Sing accusing Fein of a violation of the Sullivan law. He will be arrested on that when he completes the present sentence, which he can shorten fourteen months by good behavior.


