AND HER VICTORY FOR THE CZAR'S TROOPS

NO FOOD FROM GREAT BRITAIN HOLLAND TO WILL LAY MINES GERMANY

Dutch Gov't will prevent export of foodstuffs from country to feed Nations at War.

London, Oct. 2, 1.45 p. m.—Holland has given assurances that it will prevent the exportation of foodstuffs from Holland to Germany, or to other countries now at war.

This action by the Dutch government greatly simplifies the differences which have arisen concerning cargoes of food destined for the Netherlands, and makes it possible for the British government to cease the seizure and investigation of cargoes of foodstuffs consigned to Dutch dealers.

The British and American governments are still exchanging representations regarding copper, and some other commodities shipped from American ports to Holland, and considered by Great Britain as contraband of war.

SEVEN DAY BATTLE IN POLAND ENDS IN VICTORY FOR THE CZAR'S TROOPS

Russians Put Germans to Rout After Furious Fighting Along Niemen River—Anglo-French Fleet Attacking Adriatic Port.

London, Oct. 2, 4.45 p. m.—The official information bureau has issued the following on behalf of the Admiralty: "The German policy of mine laying, combined with their submarine activity, makes it necessary on military grounds for the Admiralty to adopt counter measures."

Unofficial reports indicate that the French and British are massing a large army for onslaught on the German's near Arras. The arrival of East Indian troops gives the allies a sufficient force to execute this manoeuvre.

Whole Companies of Germans Wiped Out. London, Oct. 2.—News from Antwerp says the position is excellent. The German dead near Wavre, St. Catherine, are counted by thousands. Entire companies have been wiped out.

A BLANKET GERMAN FAMINE FACES BRITISH ARMY HAVE FAILED IN RUSSIA
