Valuables Closely Guarded and Checked Free of Charge.

Nearly every night the London police department plays host to any number, from one to a dozen, late arrivals or homeless travelers in the city who cannot obtain accommodation at hotels or rooming-houses for one reason or another.

No very luxurious service is offered in the Carling street hostel, but the guests are invariably left at the desk, and the doors are locked by the "bell-cop" who escorts them to their rooms. BIRD NOTES

Just because there are none of what are called "winter birds" this season, it must not be supposed that "no birds" have been observed during the winter months. It is quite true that our summer birds, with that lack of foreknowledge of weather for which they are noted (among bird students) departed from us at their regular dates, and very few remained, but a few individuals of quite a number of species habitually stay the winter with us, and many of these were to be found by the earnest seeker.

So it came about that the regular "first-of-the-year" walk, which is held with religious regularity on January 1, resulted in the listing of 23 species, a surprisingly large number in the eyes of those who say "there are no birds in winter," but some of our members were disappointed at the absence of so many that have been found in other years.

This list included junco, crow, blue jay, tree sparrow, great blue heron, red-headed woodpecker, white-breasted nuthatch, ruffed grouse, red-tail hawk, purple finch, chickadee, hairy woodpecker, downy woodpecker, cardinal, red-shouldered hawk, long-eared owl, snowflake brown creeper, golden-crowned kinglet, song sparrow, bronze grackle, great horned owl.

HOLY WEEK

Priests of District Gather for Ceremonies in St. Peter's Cathedral.

BOARD APPOINTS W. A. TANNER AS NEW SECRETARY

School Trustees Disregard Promise of Preference For Veteran.

SELECTION A SURPRISE

Question Raised Whether Wife of Appointee Should Resign As Trustee.

W. A. Tanner, who has been acting secretary to the board of education since the death of the late Secretary R. M. McElhannon, was yesterday afternoon appointed secretary at a special meeting of the board, after three ballots had been taken.

It was decided to advertise for applications, to the effect that in event any veteran whose name was on the list of eligibles, and who presented qualifications equal to those of a civilian, would be given the preference.

Following the announcement of the third ballot, on the motion of Trustees Smith and Udy, the board made the appointment of W. A. Tanner, on the suggestion of Trustee Rev. A. A. Bice, requested that no name be placed in the list of eligibles, who had been placed in the first six, stating that it might injure the applicants in their present position.

One Applicant Withdrew. The ballot paper contained the names of six men whom the special committee considered to be especially qualified for the post, in alphabetical order, at the top and below these the names of 17 other applicants, also in alphabetical order. Trustees Bice before the ballot was opened and in reply to a question by Trustee Smith, read a list of the names of the applicants, whose name had been placed in the first six, stating that he wished to withdraw his application.

Principal H. B. Beal and Inspector V. K. Groer, who were present at the meeting, were named scrutineers by Chairman Trustee Rev. W. A. Tanner asked to be excused from voting. The request was granted.

On the first poll each of the five remaining names at the head of the list, and one name from the other part of the list were declared selected. On the second vote the result was as follows: 5, 3, 2, 1, 1, 0, the three low men were declared eliminated, the third vote was recorded as 7, 3, 2, and one ballot spoiled.

HOLSTEIN BREEDERS HOLD BANQUET AT CONCLUSION OF SALE

Lifting of Cattle Embargo in Great Britain Would Benefit Cattle Raisers.

At the close of the sale of pure-bred stock on Wednesday afternoon, the London district Holstein breeders dined together at the Chateau restaurant. W. J. Ellis, London Township, presided, and in the course of a few remarks said that on the whole they were fairly well satisfied with the results of the sale, although the high prices of the stock warranted better prices. However, the low price of cattle at the present time did not encourage farmers to hope for too much.

In the course of the discussion which followed, reference was made to the prospective removal of the cattle embargo in Great Britain, and the opinion was expressed that if this barrier were lifted it would benefit breeders of pure-bred stock in this country by opening up a market in the old land. There was no reason, it was said, why purebred Holsteins of the quality which that day's sale had brought forward should not be in demand among British dairy farmers, as it is well known that this breed is rapidly gaining ground there as a milk and butter producer superior to all others.

Attention was also directed to the newly-formed London District Live Stock Club, and it was generally admitted that this formed a splendid opportunity for beginners to secure some good stuff and make a start as breeders of purebred cattle.

The movement for the provision of better sties also received the hearty endorsement of the Holstein breeders. The speakers included Capt. Tom Robinson, G. F. Pearson, Frank Balfour, Stanley Shaw, and R. A. Finn, agricultural representative for Middlesex County.

Canada Is Paying 118,140 Pensions

OTTAWA, March 22.—The total amount paid with respect to C. E. F. disability pensions for the year ending December 31, 1920, was \$18,212,506, according to information given Gen. W. A. Grisdale, Edmonton West, in the House of Commons today.

The total number of persons pensioned on December 31, 1920, was 118,140. Of this number 53,454 were pensioners, 26,912 wives, and 37,773 children.

HOLSTEIN CATTLE BRING HIGH PRICES IN DISTRICT SALE

Sixty Head of Fine Stock Sold At Western Fair Grounds.

The annual spring sale of the London district Holstein breeders was held at the Western Fair grounds on Wednesday afternoon. About 60 head were placed in the ring, consisting of springers, new milkers and young bulls. There was a large attendance of buyers, and although the bidding was fairly brisk, no sensational prices were realized. In fact, considering the good quality of the stuff presented several of the animals were decided bargains.

The top price was for a fine young bull, just 1 year old, consigned by H. C. Holby of Glenworth. This bull, King Payne of Kady Grange, was a showy animal, and his dam and sire's dam's average was: Butternut, Payne, 31.83 pounds; milk, 7 days, \$18.10 pounds. The price realized was \$425, and his purchaser was J. C. Trick of Goderich.

A 5-year-old female, Jewel Pontiac, consigned by Wm. Knott of London, was sold to G. W. Keays & Sons, Hyde Park, for \$275. Other sales which realized the \$200 mark and over were as follows: Segis Wayne Harzog (female), consigned by Charles E. Holborn, sold to B. Bodkin, Asylum, for \$110; Phoebe Findern Dakot (female), consigned by F. D. Balfour, sold to J. G. Thomson, Asylum, for \$110; Marina Payne (female), consigned by W. J. Ellis, London, sold to George Collins, Asylum, for \$200; Mildred Patricia (female), consigned by W. J. Ellis, London, sold to H. N. McNeece, London Township, for \$215; Colantha Ben-gervyd Brookbank (female), consigned by A. C. Taylor, sold to Alfred Graves, Salford, for \$225; Juley Dekol Pos (female), consigned by J. A. S. Smith, Komoka, sold to J. G. Thomson, for \$240; Betty Netherland Payne (female), consigned by F. D. Balfour, sold to B. B. McCarty, Thamesford, for \$225.

There were several promising calves which brought prices up to \$25. The total sum realized was in the neighborhood of \$10,000.

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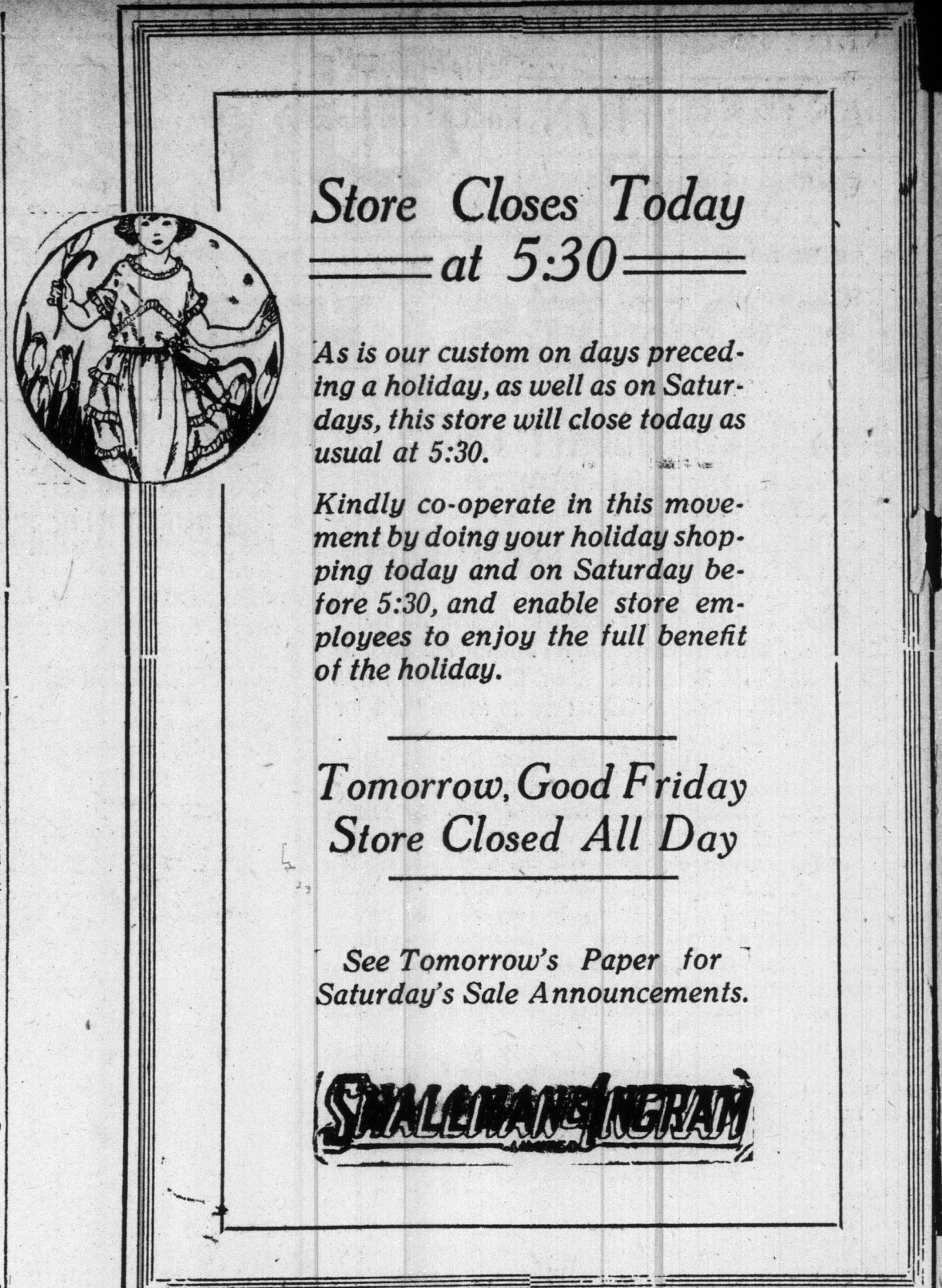
