HOMESTEAD REGULATIONS.

Any even numbered section of Dominion Lands in Manitoba or the North-west Territories, excepting 8 and 28, which has not been homesteaded, or reserved to provide word lost for settlers, or for other purposes, may be homesteaded upon by any person who is the seale head of a family, or any made over 8 seek head of a family, or any made over 8 or 18, or

ENTRY.

Entry may be made personally at the local land office for the District in which the land to be taken is situate, or if the homesteader desires be may, on application to the Minister of the interior, Cutawa, the Commissioner of the Interior, Cutawa, the Local Agent for the district in which case the Local Agent for the district in which case the Local Agent for the district in which case entry for him. A fee of 810 is charged for a homestead entry

HOMESTEAD DUTIES.

A settler who has been granted an entry for a homestead is required by the provisions of the Dominion Lands Act and the amendments thereto to perform the conditions connected therewith under one of the following plans:—

13 If a settler has obtained a patent for his homestead, or a certificate for the issue of such patent countersigned in the names pre-scribed by this Act, and has obtained entry for a second homestead, the requirements of this Act as to residence may be satisfied by residence upon the first homestead, if the set out homestead is in the vicinity of the first homestead.

(4) If the settler has his permanent residence upon tarming land owned by him in the vicinity of his household, the requirements of this Act as to residence may be satisfied by residence upon the said land.

The term "vicinity" used above is meant o indicate the same township or an adjoining r cornering township.

A settler who avails himself of the provisions of Clauses (2)(3) or (4) must cultivate 30 across of his homestead, or substitute 30 head of stock with buildings for their accommedation, and have besides 80 acres substantially fenced.

Every homesteader who fails to comply with the requirements of the homesteader law is liable to have his entry cancelled, and the land may be again thrown open for entry.

APPLICATION FOR PATENT

Should be made at the end of the three pears before the Local Agent, Sulr-Agent or the Homestead Inspector. Before unaing applica-tion for patent the settler must gives a months notice in withing to the Commissioner of Dominion Lands at Ottawa of his intention to do so.
