Conditions throughout the country are sound, from the merchandise standpoint. Stocks are well in hand, not to say small, in most instances, and it would not take much of a demand to send buyers into the market in a hurry for additional supplies. There is little or no fear of having to carry over surplus stocks at the end of the first half of the year to that
