Mr. LAWIS BROWN, P. L. S. of this town, has been commissioned by the Dominion Government as one of the Northwest land surveyors. He will leave for Winnipeg next week, and will be engaged during the season in blocking out townships between bases 5 and 6, west of the 3rd Meridian.

BASE-BALL CLUB—The pupils of the Listowel High School have organized a baseball club, with the following officers: Captain, A. Jameson; Secretary, Fred Bradley; Treasurer, R. C. Clunie. They will play ground in rear of the school, furnishing an excellent course for the lads. The club is open to receive challenges.

SPRING—Friday and Saturday last and the early part of the present week were decidedly springlike, the warm sun starting vegetation and drying the ground sufficiently to enable farmers to begin plowing on high lands. The fall wheat, which it was thought had been badly injured by the frost, has taken root and looks very promising.

EASTER VESTRY—The Vestry meeting of Christ Church will be held on Easter Monday, at 10 a. m., in the Church. The election of Warden and Lay Delegates and transaction of other business will engage the attention of the meeting. The Vestry meeting of St. Paul's Shipley, will be held at 2 p. m. on the same day.

The town land gave an oyster supper at the Commercial Hotel on Wednesday evening to Mr. Conrad Miller, who is about leaving for his home in Neustadt. Mr. Miller has been one of the most active members of the band, and he will be much missed. It is hoped, however, that his absence will be only temporary. Tax "Zoo"—The enterprising proprietors of the Toronto Zoological Gardens have arranged with the Grand Trunk Railway for cheap excursions to Toronto on Good Friday and Easter Monday. Fare from Stratford and return, including coupon giving admission to the Gardens, \$1.25. The "Zoo" is one of the greatest attractions of the Queen City.

SIDEWALKS—The town fathers made their annual work on this subject last night, and have ascertained that a very considerable quantity of sidewalks may be built this season without going beyond the necessities of the situation. Preparations are already being made for building new walks on Wallace and one or two other streets.

High School Board.—Board met on Wednesday evening, 4th inst. The Principal presented his monthly report of the attendance and progress of the school, the average attendance being 63, and the general progress satisfactory. Mr. McMillan also reported that he had divided the intermediate scholars into senior and junior classes. A motion was adopted reducing the fees to be paid by the junior intermediate class from \$1 to 75 cents per month for the next three months. A number of small accounts were passed. The Chairman and Messrs. McKinney and R. Ferguson were appointed a Committee to select the requisite number of shale and ornamental trees for the school grounds, with power to purchase same. Board then adjourned.

PUBLIC SCHOOL BOARD.—Regular meeting of Board held on Tuesday evening, 4th inst. Present, J. P. Newman, Chairman, D. Roy, W. Bingham and Dr. Burgess. The attention of the Board was called to the bad ventilation of the room occupied by the 4th dept. The Principal's report for March showed the total No. on roll, 462, average attendance, 367. A petition, signed by a large number of ratepayers of the town, was presented by Dr. Burgess, for whitewashing the German language be taught in the Public School. The Secretary was instructed to write to Inspector Clapp and ascertain his opinion as to introducing the German language. The following accounts were passed: G. S. Clunie & Sons, for fixing new furnace, \$16.54; Tom. Malo, caretaker, for whitewashing during holidays, \$2, said amount to be expended in flower seeds for school grounds; John Stevenson, on account wood contract, \$35. Dr. Burgess called the attention of the Board to the absence of Mr. E. B. Sutherland from the meetings of the Board for the past three months, which rendered his seat vacant. A motion was made to suspend Mr. Sutherland until next meeting. Board then adjourned.
