BRANT DEANERY
SUNDAY SCHOOL
OFFICERS ELECTED

Methods of Work Discussed
on Thursday Evening at
Well Attended Meeting.

A meeting of the Brant Deanery
Sunday School Association was held at Grace Church Sunday School on Thursday evening.

Rural Dean Saunders was in the
chair. There was a large attendance of clergy, Sunday school teachers, workers and others interested in the moral and religious welfare of the children.

Reports and election of officers
for the ensuing term resulted in the following appointments: Hon. President, Rural Dean Saunders; Vice-President, Rev. J. S. Adamson; Secretary, Mr. Henry Hamilton; Treasurer, Mr. J. S. Adamson; Superintendent of font roll, Miss Emily Bunnell; superintendent of Home department, Miss Edna Senn; superintendent of Adult Bible class, Mr. E. W. J. Hunt; superintendent of Missionary department, Miss Pearl; superintendent Teacher Training department, Mr. A. Morrison.

Miss Emily Bunnell then read a
highly interesting paper on the work of her department, which aims at teaching in touch with the children from the time of their baptism until they become old enough to take their place in the Sunday school classes.

Miss Edna Senn followed her with
a well thought out paper on the work of her department, which aims at teaching in the homes of those who from any causes are unable to attend Sunday schools.

Both these papers were well dis-
cussed by the chairman and others. The Rev. Dr. Renison dealing with the subject of getting children to attend Sunday schools and obtaining their attention while there. The reverend speaker who had spent many years as a missionary amongst the Indians and Eskimoes on the shores of Hudson Bay and Labrador, had for about four years never heard the English language spoken, he has been enthusiastic of the results. He has obtained in his parish in Hamilton, he stated that there he uses moving pictures, lantern slides and pictures to illustrate the lessons. He strongly advocated the method of teaching more with the eye than the ear.

Mr. H. W. J. Hunt then sought
information as to the best methods of retaining the boys in the Sunday school after they have attained fourteen years or thereabouts.

In the discussion which followed
methods were advised by the Rev. Dr. Renison and the Rev. Patterson Smythe. The latter in accepting the presidency, humbly described himself as a rebel from some of the methods generally in vogue, but promised compliance with the regulations of his position. Speaking to the question or Mr. Hunt he stated that in Grace church they have started a Club Lads Brigade as that is an organization by which good results have been obtained in England in retaining the interest and membership of the boys right up to manhood. He had great hopes that it would prove successful at Grace church Sunday schools.

The Board of Police Commission-
ers met at the office of His Honour, Judge Hardy, yesterday afternoon when many little items of minor importance were dealt with, but nothing of importance done.

Mr. J. L. Dixon gave the Commis-
sion a talk upon telephone economy, and dealt with the cheapest and best way to use phones and how to secure the best service. He also dealt with the local distance phone calls of prisoners asking aid and his address was very instructive.

The Commission desired particu-
lars of the \$1,000 reward offered by the murderer of one of their number, Lee Duck. In order to send out circulars and to place a time limit, it was necessary for the Board to take over the control of the \$1,000 which has been banked and as the Chinese community are willing to allow the Commission to take over the reward, the Chief was left to arrange matters and to send out the circulars dealing with the case.

Mr. Greenaway and Mrs. Lake ob-
jected to the Salvation Army obtaining second hand clothes and giving them away in exchange for work to necessitous cases. That they claimed, was tantamount to trading in second-hand clothes and as they had no license to carry on such a business, the complainants took objection to the Commission taking no action in the matter, merely laying it aside for the time being. It was generally felt that the Salvation Army in their good work were not infringing on license regulations of the city.

A neat little present in the shape
of a Gillette Safety Razor, in a strong metal case, will be presented to Corporal Cobden, who is now in the Hospital at Boulogne. He had mentioned the fact that he had lost his razor in the trenches, when they were forced to make a hurried exit. The Commission took advantage of this opportunity to show their appreciation of a valuable servant and the razor will be dispatched to-day.

A number of accounts were passed
for payment and the meeting closed. Those present were His Honour Judge Hardy, Magistrate Livingston and Chief Slemm.

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BOYS FOR FIRING LINE
NEW YORK, Nov. 28.—A cable to
the Tribune from Copenhagen says: Twelve thousand school boys, between the ages of fifteen and seventeen have been enrolled as volunteers in Berlin. They have been divided into twenty companies, and their military training is proceeding with all possible speed. It is intended that they shall take the field early in the spring. Many will then be under sixteen. In the province of Brandenburg, which includes Berlin, 60,000 school boys have been enrolled as volunteer recruits.

London Board of Control decided
to insure the 150 London men going with the second contingent, paying two years' premiums to an Indianapolis company, averaging \$1.50 each.
