TORPEDO BOAT NO. 96 SUNK IN COLLISION

By S echal Wire to the Courier London, Nov. 2, 1.50 p.m. - The British Admiralty this afternoon announced that the British torpedo boat No. 96 was sunk at Gibraltar yester-

day after being in collision.

The 96 was built 21 years ago. She was 140 feet long and her displacement was 130 tons. She was armed with three 3-pounders and three torpedo tubes. Her normal complement
