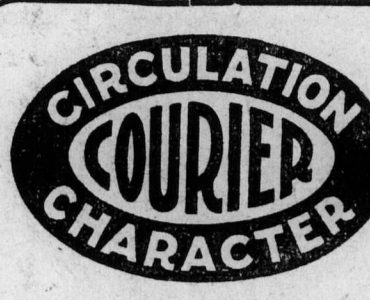

FROM DESERT RAT TO HEAD OF U.S. MINT

Picturesque Career of Ray Baker, Who Now Makes All of Uncle Sam's Money—Miner, Soldier, Diplomat, He's Tried 'Em All.

From "desert rat" to boss of Uncle Baker and Salsbury had bought a claim, began to pour into Tonopah. Then the 1907 panic broke and there was no demand for copper or anything else. This was followed by the Rawhide gold boom. Ray was one of the first to get in and located the "Windy Point" and "Dead Mule" claims. By and by Eastern people came clamoring for Baker's claims. Both had good showings and Ray sold for a neat figure, had good-bye to the picturesque gold-mad camp and went to Europe. One of the celebrities he met over there was Elmer Gwinn. She was charmed with the tales the handsome young Hercules told of the West, at it goes without saying that his own deeds were clothed in modesty. The hardest thing to do with Ray Baker is to get him to talk of himself. But the author got his promise to show her a mining-camp when she "came over" in the following year. He showed her Rawhide. But it wasn't the Rawhide that he had left. The gold hadn't "gone down" and there was very little money in the camp. But Ray came like a lion from the sun, to the men who were trying to raise money enough to get home, to get somewhere. He was bringing with the famous author, Sam Newhouse mining magnate, of whom which had been brought in for prospective millionaires who never picked from the hills. After Rawhide Mr. Baker did the Deice far niente in Reno, Reno—well, Reno is a pretty town through which flows the romantic Truckee River and besides "Jack" Salsbury, Ray's former partner, lives there. "Jack" has travelled too. He came to New York and was recommended to the Waldorf-Astoria, but discovered that it wasn't so first-class after all. They don't keep condensed milk here. A Hand in Politics. Then Mr. Baker tried his hand at politics. He went back to Tonopah to manage the campaign of his brother, who was running for District Attorney. "Cleave" won, and at the age of twenty-six he was the Attorney-General of the State. When it came to the next fight in Nevada for United States Senator Mr. Baker managed Key Pittman's campaign. He went to Washington with Senator Pittman. George T. Mayer of Nevada, was appointed ambassador to Russia. Mr. Baker went with him as confidential secretary and assistant. Mr. Baker saw whether the wind was blowing and plunged on "war-babes." Mr. Baker's judgment was profounded. His adventurous spirit found court life in Petrograd dull. He was too democratic to be continually kowtowing to czars and counts and dukes and other pre-revolutionary dignitaries. He wanted to go to the front to see what real war was like and they wouldn't let him. So he went to the front and went again, despite the opposition of the forementioned dignitaries. He saw something there the like of which he never saw in the wild and woolly West, and up to that time he had imagined the frontier some life. And now Ray Baker, desert rat, mining man, traveller, society man, good "bad man", political war-buff, court favorite, diplomat in "war-babes," and diplomat, is director of the Mint, in his thirties, eligible does not drink and with a bank roll that would make Croesus turn over in his grave.

ONE HUNDRED ARE BELIEVED DEAD

Heavy Loss of Life As Result of N. S. Mine Explosion

Stellarton, N.S., Jan. 24.—No signs of life were heard to-day in the Allan shaft of the Acadia Coal Company's mine, where an explosion occurred last evening. The rescue workers managed to get the upper levels and there found fifteen bodies. The number of miners unaccounted for is 85, for whose safety little hope is entertained. Many of them are a thousand feet under the ground and cut off from help from the outside by huge falls of coal. The cause of the explosion is unofficially given as an accumulation of gas. One of the Government's inspectors entered this shaft this afternoon to begin an investigation into the disaster. In the meantime every preparation has been made to look after any injured that may be rescued. **HIDES HOARDED?** Washington, Jan. 24.—Hoarding of hides by meat packers, while shoe prices have been climbing upward, and excessive profits to the packers, who practically control the hide market, are charged in a report by the Federal Trade Commission, submitted to-day to Congress.
