The feeling there is that Lemberg will again fall into Russian hands.

Crossing the River Sereth, in Bukowina, General Letchitzky's forces have progressed slightly further south in pursuit of the Austrian General Pflanzer's army, but in the centre and along the northern flank the Russian drive has been halted by the fierce counter-offensive of the
