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NO MORE CREDIT TO CUSTOMERS

There is a possibility of English retail stores ceasing to give credit to customers for a time perhaps for the duration of the war, as a means of forcing economy. The National Service Department has sent out to retail traders the following proposals with a view to obtaining their criticisms:

Credit accounts between retail traders and the public shall be discontinued. No tradesman shall call on or send to any customer to solicit orders for any article of food. Every customer must take away with him when he buys any article or articles of food of less than 14 pounds weight.
