Lyn's Leading Industry
Brief Sketch of the Past and Present of Lyn's
Famous Flouring Mill.



Something over 30 years ago, the late Richard Coleman, of Lyn, con-
ceived the idea of building up an industry in his native village that would
give employment to a large number of mechanics and make the village one of
the best manufacturing centres in Canada. The only drawback was the lack
of motive power, and an steam power in those days was far more expensive
than at present, he concluded to utilize the water stretches in the vicinity for
the purpose of furnishing the power required. His knowledge of the water-
shed of the surrounding country enabled him to see at a glance how he could
make the water supply running to Lyn almost inexhaustible. He first pur-
chased the Temperance property, whereby he was enabled to control the
flow of water from the lake and streams leading into it. He purchased the
McIntosh Mills and then erected a dam known as the "marsh bridge dam"
at the head of Graham lake, (the natural supply of the McIntosh Mills), and
thus shut off the supply that formerly ran through a low, swampy tract be-
tween the marsh and Temperance lake. By building the marsh bridge all the
water that formerly passed on through Graham lake was held in a reservoir
that covered several hundred acres. His next undertaking was to cut a canal
from this reservoir to the original Lyn mill pond, a distance of nearly one
mile. This canal was about 15 feet wide at the top and 8 feet at the bottom,
with an average depth of 10 feet. It allowed the water to flow from the
reservoir referred to into the Lee, or old Lyn, mill pond, as it was generally
called. The increased volume of water in this pond made it necessary to
build a large and massive dam at the lower end of this pond, and when all
was completed, he had one of the best inland water powers to be found in
Ontario. Following the course of the creek down from this dam to the
small pond at the north-western side of the village, it became necessary to
enlarge and raise the old dam there, and by building a large stone flume from
there to the brow of a hill, he had a clear fall of over 60 feet.

While all the changes and improvements above mentioned were in pro-
gress, the master mind, who was the controlling factor in their promotion,
was busy in preparing plans for the erection of a flouring mill, on a scale
never before attempted in Eastern Ontario, and by the time the water was
ready to be let out of the ponds, the mill was ready for the first trial. The
system of grinding in vogue was the old burr stone, and even this, what is
now called, primitive, mode of converting grain into flour, was such as
to draw the custom to the new mill from the whole country about Lyn.
Of the factories projected and put into operation as the result of this exten-
sive water power, obtained as above related, or of the sudden and tragic
death of the chief promoter of all the improvements mentioned, it is not
probable that any one will speak. Suffice it to say in this connection, that
on the death of Mr. Coleman the vast enterprises and properties passed into
other hands. It is truly said that Rich. Coleman made Lyn what it is—a
busy business centre—and that his loss made Lyn what it remained for
years, practically dead as far as business operations were concerned.
Back then years that Lyn had "been lying dormant, so to speak," a
young Scotch lad had been plodding along in many subordinate positions
around the village, who was ultimately to take first rank amongst the busi-
ness men of the whole Dominion. James Cumming was at the time we first
write about a mere lad. As a boy he was writing, reading and obliging; as a
young man he displayed a remarkable aptitude for business, and when
everything looked the darkest for the financial prosperity of his adopted vil-
lage, he never for one moment lost faith in the capabilities of the surround-
ings to make the village regain, if not surpass, its former business activity.
When therefore, in 1872, he was appointed manager by successfully conducted
the business until 1887, when Messrs. Chas. and Rivers took the manage-
ment into their own hands and sank \$50,000 in the business between that
time and 1878. He was again offered the management which he held for a short
time when he made a proposition to purchase the whole estate. This pro-
posal was gladly assented to by those having the property in charge. Mr.
Cumming's first move was to completely remodel the mill. He com-
menced to make flour by what was then termed the "New Process." Later
on a new department was made, and by a combination of mill-stones, rolls
and purifiers, the quality of the flour turned out was much improved. And,
as present it turns out for the home and shipping trade the following well
known brands A, B, C, and D grades which lead the fancy flours of the mills
of the west in the eastern markets. A few weeks ago a Reporter representa-
tive was shown over the mill and mentally made note of a few of the most
interesting items in connection with the mill and the extensive business
carried on. As will be readily seen from the above excellent out (which was
made direct from a look view taken at the time of our visit, the mill is of
stone, five stories in height, and presents a very attractive and imposing ap-
pearance as viewed from any position.

On the ground floor are situated the motors, which consist of two 14
inch giant wheels developing 90 h. p. under a pressure of 60 feet. The
water is carried from the brow of the hill to the wheels by large wrought iron
tubes. Ascending to the 2nd flat we found the rolls, consisting of a line of
six pairs break rolls and eight pairs smooth reduction rolls; a four foot burr
for No. 2 middlings, three large purifiers, one monitor feed mill (for custom
grinders) and the heating apparatus, which is a system of steam pipes at-
tached to the sides of the building. The 3rd flat contains the bolting machin-
ery. This consists of one chest of double operating Lima scalpers, four hex-
agon scalpers, four flouring reels, two cylindrical flouring reels, two separating
purifiers, one Cyclone dust collector, and the required number of supply
hoppers for the breakers. On the 4th flat are placed two Silver Creek disinter-
grating centrifugals, one tallies reel, one planifier, the first machine of its
kind built in Canada. This is a recent Hungarian invention and is said to
be the most important change made in milling machinery since the adoption
of the rolls. It resembles a large piano hung up in mid air, gyrating at the
speed of 160 shafts per minute. It does the work of 8 reels, saves 50 per
cent in power and room and makes a much improved quality of flour over the
old rolls.
The 5th flat is where the wheat cleaners are run. They consist of one
Booth separator, one Harrow separator, one Large separator, one Europa brush
and one cockle machine and grader, and arranged and driven by a horizontal
shaft from the shafting beneath. In another compartment on this flat are placed
one ofal grader, one bran duster, one shorts duster, and the air tanks. The
6th flat lands us in the garret, a distance of 74 feet from the ground. Here
the shafting terminates and ends used in running the wheat elevator and
a few other pieces of machinery.
Owing to the favorable situation of this modern enterprise, and the
facilities afforded by the easy access to the Grand Trunk, Canadian Pacific
and Brockville and Westport railways, for receiving and delivering shipments to
the Dominion, it is the best mill in the Dominion. In the local courts
in one of an annex in which is located an efficient steam plant, to be used
in case of accident to the water supply or machinery. Mr. Cumming is
assisted in the management of his extensive business by his two sons, who
also display the same marked adaptability for the management of extensive
enterprises as their father. At some future time we may have occasion to
refer to some of the other extensive branches of the mill.
