He Writes The Planet His Views **Upon the City Engineer** Discussion.

ncidentally Throws Cut Ideas on In creasing Tax Rate and Foor Streets.

Chatham, March 16th, 1901. Dear Sir,-Re engaging a city engin er. Our city councit will be held re sponsible for the good management of our civic affairs for the present year On them centres the responsibility properly, judiciously and economical managing the trust imposed upon them, and I think it a mistake to in-terfere with them by petition or other-wise, until, at least, it is clearly seen that they are not lovorking in the in-terests of our city. The supplies terests of our city. The success of failure of any business man, company or municipality rests more upon the judicious selection of competent par-ties to manage the different depart ments of their business than an other factor; and I think the rate payers or others who signed the petition for the re-appointment of Mr Shackleton made a grave mistake in doing so. It was our aldermen's duty to find out if our city affairs in the past had been managed in the best and most economical method. Now, truly believe that a judicious experditure is the truest economy. How our expenditure running to-day? It i scarcely seven years since the frontag tax was imposed for the construction of our pavements, sewers and side walks. They were the principal items of our civic expenditure, and yet to-day our rate of taxation is higher than it was previous to the frontage tax being imposed. What have we to show for the heavy increased taxa-tion? Some of our sidewalks and crossings and a portion of King street are improved; all with the ex-ception of the crossings, by the frontage tax. Yet we have an assessme on a high valuation of 25 mills. is well for the ratepayers that a sta statute will not allow a much high

er rate. Again, in the near future is true welfare of the city a general pla of improving our streets should be adopted. We have unfrequently the worst streets, as a whole of any cit in the Dominion, Coatham mud being by-word wherever you go. Is it to ou nterest that such should be the case Unquestionably, no. The improvement and economical management o our city is a matter of vital impo tance to us all. The employment of first class manager, or civil engineer one who by experience or past record can safely be trusted with the man-agement of our board of works depart ment, and who would be held strictly to the performance of his duties by the board of works committee is an abso lute necessity. How would it appear to you, Mr. Editor, if you had even a faint suspicion that you were not get ting the best results obtainable an decided upon making a change in any of your departments, and parties who by their profession and calling did not practically understand the nature of the work in hand, criticise your act in doing so. It is wrong in principle. Those that are held responsible should have a free hand. The ratepayers by their votes have selected those upon whom that trust should rest, and un-I they are tried and found wanting we should place every confidence in them. Believing that in the true in-

terest of our city that our aldermen

and mayor are endeavoring to fulfill the duty amposed upon them, I am, Yours truly. JOHN PIGGOTT. Note.-Mr. Piggott's communication deserves a careful perusal by every ratepayer in the city. The analysis of the causes for the increased tax rate and the suggested improvement of the thoroughfares, alluded to in his letter, are matters well deserving of careful consideration. In considering the city engineer's case, however, Mr. Piggott the employed of the petitioning ratepayers, who rargely assist in paying his salary, as of the council elected to represent them, and act for their best interests. The ratepayers demanded by by-law a city engineer, and their mandate should be respected by their representatives. There would be some force in Mr. Piggott's contention that the aldermen should be given a free hand to violate the wishes of the citizens, as expressed in this bylaw, had they upon investigation ascertained that Mr. Shackleton's retention of the duties was injurious to the city's interests, or that there was at least some foundation for the cry of incompetency raised by his detractors. No investigation of this kind was held, but in the face of the protest from the Chairman of the Board of Works-the civic representative who is undisputably in the best position to judge of the engineer's services and of their civic value-Mr. Shackleton was summarily dismissed. It is largely on this account that The Planet

deems the Aldermen would do well, in the face of such an influential petition, to reconsider their action, and we feel assured in the full light of the whole circumstances Mr. Piggott himself would endorse no other processing


