THE AFRICAN INVASION

ARMIES OF TOURISTS AND SET-TLERS ARE ON THE MARCH.

They Have Aiready Driven Big Game From the Coasts-Opening Up of the Zambezi Region to Commerce, Tourists and Hunters-Just Fifty Years Since Livingstone First Saw Victoria Falla

South Africa is a great place for big game, but it will not remain so long now that tourists and hunting parties are invading it in railroad trains and are invading it in railroad trains and steamboats. A few weeks ago the bridge over the Zambezi river, the highest bridge in the world, located near the once inaccessible Victoria falls, was formally opened in the presence of numerous dignitaries. At the conclusion of an oration which touched upon the significance of the occasion an electric button was presstouched upon the significance occasion an electric button was pressed, an engine decorated with Union Jasks was started, and in this way the first formal trip over the bridge was made. The Victoria falls were discov-

It was in 1855 that Livingstone, first of white men to behold them, gazed upon the mighty cataract, and the tree is still pointed out on which he cut his initials soon after the wonderful scene burst upon his delighted vision. The eminent personages who traveled thither to take part in the opening of the bridge did not have to spend months on the route and encounter months on the route and encounter the severest of hardships, but jour-neyed in a "train de luxe," with all the conveniences of modern travel, including dining rooms, kitchens, bed-rooms, bathrooms, smoking parlors and observation cars. At the falls they found the hospitalities of a modern

hotel awaiting them.

Africa is the last of the continents to yield to the all conquering power of modern civilization. Its interior reof modern civilization. Its interior remained a mystery up to a comparatively recent period. As the equator cuts the continent in two and the climate is tropical from the Mediterranean to the Cape, vegetation is luxuriant, and the rank growth of trees and plants often hides animals of huge size and rapacious appetite, But already these animals are beginning to size and rapacious appetite. But aiready these animals are beginning to fice from the screech of the locomotive. The lion is the typical carnivore of Africa, and next to him in ferocity is the leopard. Elephant and hippoprotant is the leopard. Elephant and rhinoceros herds abound and hippopotamismin the big lakes and rivers, occasionally coming to the surface, their huge backs looking like strange submarine vessels suddenly appearing above the ripples and the waves. Another animal peculiar to Africa and rarely found elsewhere is the giraffe, while the forests of the central portions of the continent resound to the cries of chimpanzees and govillar tions of the continent resound to the cries of chimpanzees and gorillas jackals and hyenas. There is still plenty of big game to be had, but the hunting parties, the commercial traffic in elephant tusks, the quests to supply the demands of circuses and hippodromes and the gradual settlement of the countries on the coasts are driving the large wild animals farther and farther into the interior. The railway lines which now penetrate Rhodesia make arrangements to carry bunting parties in special cars with all conspecial cars with all con-



BIG GAME OF THE ZAMBEZI REGION niences for prolonged stays, so that e cars may be sidetracked and used for headquarters during the hunting trip. When railways were first intro-duced in Rhodesia it used to be cus-tomary to stop the trains sometimes

duced in Rhodesia it used to be customary to stop the trains sometimes for passengers to take shots at wandering lions or at some of the game birds which abound, but nowadays there are no such interruptions to the railway schedule.

At Victoria falls a fine hotel in the Byzantine style of architecture is in course of erection to take the place of the temporary structure now in use for the accommodation of tourists. It is in the "Park of Peace," which is being laid out on the south side of the falls. Even thus early in the career of the cataract as an attraction for tourists steps have been taken to preserve the natural beauties of the location. It is estimated that in the flood season at least 35,000,000 horsepower is continually going to waste at Victoria falls. The project of harnessing them is now talked of, but it will be some time before diversion of the water for industrial purposes will be in danger of destroying the grandeur of the scene.


