Editorial Brevities.

Parliament met on Thursday of last week. Mr. E. N. Rhodes, of Cumberland county, was chosen speaker. The formal opening took place on Friday. The speech from the Throne was brief, referring to the war, to the appropriations connected with it, to the national property and forecasting legislation further extending the term of Parliament.

By the will of Lord Lucas, former President of the British Board of Agriculture, a member of the Royal Flying Corps, recently killed in France, two well known writers, Hilaire Belloc and Gilbert K. Chesterton, receive respectively \$25,000 and \$5,000. The speeches do not disclose the reasons for these bequests. Possibly they represent a public man's grateful appreciation of the good work of brilliant journalists. The world is full of men in high places whose reputations rest largely on what newspaper men have done for them. Few receive the rewards that have come to Belloc and Chesterton.

Wolfville Board of Trade.

Notwithstanding the disagreeable state of the weather last Friday evening the meeting of the Board of Trade was one of the most successful in its history.

There was a large attendance of citizens and a spirit of optimism prevailed that augurs well for a successful year's work in the interest of the community.

President Hales gave a comprehensive and interesting report of the doings of the Board during the past year.

In the absence of Dr. G. E. DeWitt his report of the proceedings of the Western Board of Trade, which he attended as a delegate for the Wolfville Board, was read by Dr. DeWitt. It was a most interesting account of the meeting and received close attention.

Mr. J. F. Herbin gave an extended report of operations at Grand Pre, and an outline of what was hoped for the future of conditions there.

The matter of the proposed public garden for Wolfville was discussed at length. The work is to be undertaken energetically during the coming summer.

The evening was spent in the discussion of the proposed work of the Patriotic Planting Club and other matters affecting the interests of the town, a number of which will probably take definite shape in the near future.

Y. M. C. A. Work at the Front.

As Canada's army overseas in excess, the Military Service Department of the Y. M. C. A. keeps pace in addition to its rank of workers among our soldiers in England and in France. Ten more men have just sailed and two more will leave shortly, making in all 82 special officers appointed to look after the comforts and religious welfare of our men, not only in camp and in hospital, but in dugouts in shelled areas just behind the firing line. Already two have given up their lives, one shot and killed; another, the victim of overwork and exposure.

Among the last group of overseas secretaries are two men well known in the Maritime provinces: Capt. C. G. Mackenzie, of Charlottetown, P. E. I., and Capt. J. A. McKay, of Little Branch, N. B.

Capt. Mackenzie is a graduate of Acadia College and was appointed Student Secretary at Delouise, and travelled considerably in the Maritime Provinces in connection with these duties. During the past summer he was the chief of staff at Aldershot Camp.

Capt. McKay is also a graduate of Acadia College and for two years was the housemaster at Acadia Academy.

For several years he served as assistant pastor in Hants and Hantswick sections of St. Stephen's congregation. During the summer of 1916 he was on the Y. M. C. A. staff at Aldershot and did service also at Fredericton.

Lending to Canada.

Begin now to save for the next war loan, is the request the Minister of Finance makes to the people of Canada. It is a request from the financial head of the country to every Canadian community and to every individual concern to economize, to cut expenditures to the minimum and to place at the services of the government for war purposes every dollar that can be provided. War saving is more than a duty. It is a necessity. If the people of Canada in their community life and their individual life do not respond spontaneously and enthusiastically to the Finance Minister's request, the Finance Minister will be under the painful necessity of devising more drastic measures to enforce as a command what he now states as a request. Not lightly must the call of duty be considered, but thoughtfully, seriously and with a full recognition of the problems facing this country and of the individual responsibility toward those problems. At the present time there is no prospect of an easy peace, no reason for belief that Canada's war effort can be slackened and Canada's war burdens lightened. All the indications point to a prolonged struggle, to an extension of Canada's responsibilities, with a corresponding increase of Canada's financial demands. Money is needed in ever increasing quantities, and the government, through its war loans and its short term certificates, is giving all classes, from the merchant and capitalist to the clerk and wage-earner, a good opportunity to assist and reap at the same time a satisfactory financial return. To the working classes the new certificates of \$25, \$50 and \$100 should prove most attractive. The man or woman who saves \$21.50 can buy a certificate for which \$25 will be received at the end of three years, while \$43 will buy the \$50 certificate, and \$86 the \$100 certificate. Redeemable at any time at a proportionate advance, the certificates are an ideal investment for clerks and artisans who want to save for themselves and help Canada's war efforts. Every Canadian has an opportunity to assist.

To Win the War.

Halifax, Jan. 22nd.—Word has come from England that a number of women, the wives of Canadian officers and men who have gone to England, are to be returned. The food situation in England is getting to be very acute. It is a question largely of transportation, and where vessels are being sunk at the present rate the shortage is likely to get more and more severe. It is estimated there are several thousand Canadian women in England, and by returning them home where food is plentiful the situation will be relieved to some extent. The most patriotic thing which they can do is to return as soon as possible.

Recruiting in Canada is improving largely due to the fact that we are now settling down to finish the war. We know that it must be finished by man power and that nothing else will avail. All talk of peace is now forgotten, and everyone is using his best effort and giving his best ability to carry the war, not only to a successful conclusion but to a speedy one.

Large demands are now being made on all branches of the Service, and in Nova Scotia recruiting is coming up for practically every branch. The Infantry is, of course, the main reliance of any army and the other branches can only be used as the Infantry is recruited. The 24th Reserve Battalion is filling up but there are still some vacancies. It has been reported that both the 8th and the 15th are going to the front as units in the new 5th Division.

The 193rd and 219th have been broken up to fill in the gaps which drafts have made and to reinforce the other battalions. There is a strong hope that the 24th will soon be up to strength and the authorities are of the opinion that as soon as it is filled up they will be sent overseas, for two battalions of the Highland Brigade which are going to the front.

Seed Wheat and Ground Limestone.

The Executive Committee of the Kings County Farmers' Association will do what is possible to secure seed wheat, beans and ground limestone for farmers at the lowest possible rate. The quantity required of each must be known before any definite move is made. Farmers who desire assistance must advise the Committee in writing before February 1st. Any applications after that date will not be entertained. Those who have wheat or beans for sale will advise the Committee as all seed wheat within the county will, no doubt, be required.

Agricultural Societies should assist by finding out the requirements of their members. All business done through the County Association is cash when delivery is made.
