

Former Cardstonian Making Good

The following is taken from a report of a recital held in New York City, Monday July 19, 1920, by Marion Stravinsky and Leo M. Coombs: "A very enjoyable event was the joint recital given at the New York School of Music and Arts last Monday evening by Marion Stravinsky and Leo M. Coombs, two talented pupils of the well known voice teacher Ralphe Lecch Sterner.

"Miss Stavrovsky is from Pennsylvania and possesses a dramatic soprano voice of unusual beauty of quality and tone shading and sings with true dramatic style and power. Her part of the program was rendered in a very artistic and admirable manner.

"Mr. Coombs comes from Alberta, Canada, and his tenor voice is of pleasing quality and he delighted his hearers with his clear diction and artistic style of singing. His rendition of "Spirto Gentil" from "La Favorita" was particularly good. He made a deep impression with his appealing quality. Frank Howard Warner the eminent composer and teacher was at the piano. Two of his beautiful compositions being sung by Mr. Coombs.

Conditions were never better in the Cardston district. Visitors who have a splendid opportunity of judging and form an estimate of conditions throughout the province, are greatly struck by the heavy growth of hay, grain and root crops.

At last the British are beginning to take effective repressive measures in Ireland. The military have been firing upon rioters. When a people get to that point where they are not open to reason and refuse to listen to common sense, they must be restrained. The pity is that repression of the sort now started had not been initiated sooner.

The C. P. R. have to dig about five hundred carloads of farm soil from their right-of-way between Kipp and Monarch. This soil blew in from farms of the district, and contains seedling that under fair conditions should have produced millions of saplings.

Already there is a shortage of farm labor in Alberta and employment bureaux in the city are not able to meet the demand. This is an unusual situation at this season and augurs ill for the harvest time when the demand will be immensely greater.

The Murray government has been returned to power in Nova Scotia with two less supports than it had in the last legislature. The Conservative opposition is practically wiped out of existence and the farmer and Labor parties have gained representation in the house. There was no special reason why the Murray government should have been defeated and, being a sensible-minded lot the Blue Noses left it where it was.

The French system of restoring order in Asia Minor is to publicly hang all the agitators. If they do enough of it the system is bound to prove effective.
