DOUBLE DROWNING AT LAKEVILLE

While Skating, Two Young Men Lose
Lives, While Third Has
Narrow Escape.

Our Centreville correspondent gives the following account of the double drowning accident which took place at Lakeville recently:

Our citizens were much stirred on Wednesday evening, when they received the shocking intelligence of the double drowning fatality at Lakeville, when Russell Corbett and Garfield Matheson lost their lives. The young lads, who were about 15 years of age, with a large number of associates, went on the large lake adjacent to town on a skating party. The two young fellows along with Willie Wilson, strayed away from the rest, and while skating over some thin ice it broke beneath their weight, precipitating them all in the icy water. The two former chaps sank almost immediately, while the latter who was able to swim, succeeded in getting to solid ice, and clambered out. He gave the warning immediately and steps were at once instituted to recover the bodies. The accident occurred in the middle of the lake and by the time that help and suitable apparatus were procured, some time had elapsed. By dint of eager and earnest effort, the bodies were raised about eleven o'clock, but not until the young lives had been hopelessly snuffed out. Loving hands conveyed the bodies home and gave kindly ministrations. The joint funeral services of the two deceased young men were held at the Church at Williams-town on Friday afternoon at 3 p. m. A large crowd attended the obsequies. Despite the fact that this lake has been a skating resort for generations, this is the first drowning accident, and speaks in loud accents of the necessity of great precaution during the early part of the skating season.
