GOAL ARRIVES FOR VANCOUVER

The American barkentine Alta, which left British Columbia in the spring with lumber for Australia has arrived in the Royal Roads with a full cargo of coal for Vancouver from Newcastle, New South Wales.

Her cargo is consigned to Macdonald, Marpole Company. After discharging she will go to Victoria and berth at the Canadian-Puget Sound Lumber Company's mills to load 1,500,000 feet of lumber for South Africa. Captain Thornagel, part owner and former master of the Alta, met the vessel at Victoria. She will proceed to Victoria at once.

CURTAIN OUTLET OF MILLS BY ONE-THIRD. Aberdeen, Wash., Aug. 30.—The West Coast Lumbermen's Association yesterday ordered a curtailment of one third in the output of the mills beginning September 1, owing to dullness in the lumber market. Thirty mills were represented, situated in western Washington and Portland, and it is said that all the large mills in the northwest will co-operate. The method of decreasing the output was not decided on. Most of the mills will work only four days a week, it is said. The output will be reduced 30,000,000 feet a day. Members at the meeting thought that a reduction of time for 30 days would remedy situation.

COMPLAINS THAT SEA ELEPHANTS ARE KILLED. Los Angeles, Aug. 30.—The alleged wholesale slaughter of sea elephants on Guadalupe Island, off the coast of Lower California, is under investigation by the federal government here today. The slaughtering of the hides of these creatures through American ports was reported to the customs officials by Charles B. Davis, naturalist and miner, who said one of the last sea elephant herds in the world had been but annihilated within the last month. Of the 200 animals that composed the herd, only 16 remain, he said. Davis named several places where he believed some of the hides could be found.

BRITANNIA MINES STRIKE IS ENDED. Compromise has been successful in ending the strike at Britannia mines Howe Sound, which has been in progress since February last, and which affected some 600 men. OPPOSED BAIL BEING GRANTED

Victoria, Aug. 27.—The granting of bail in the cases of the strike leaders who were arrested at Cumberland will be opposed by the Provincial Government. With that object in view Mr. J. D. Taylor, Vancouver, has been instructed by Acting-Provincial Attorney General to go to Nanaimo.

In discussing this matter yesterday the Hon. W. J. Bower intimated that this course was being followed because against two of the men there are other cases pending. Some months before they had been charged with a breach of the law and had been let out on bail, and since that the Crown had not been able to press the case, with the result that the men were still free when the strike came on. Instead of observing the caution which a man under bail might be expected to exercise, they apparently entered into the strike troubles and are now faced with other charges.

"I think" said Mr. Bower "we are entitled to press against bail being allowed now in such cases. I have asked Mr. J. D. Taylor, of Vancouver, to go to Nanaimo and represent the Crown in the matter when the cases come before Mr. Judge Barker."

SYNOPSIS OF COAL MINING REGULATIONS

Coal mining right of the Dominion in Manitoba, Saskatchewan and Alberta, the Yukon Territory, the North-west Territories and a portion of the Province of British Columbia, may be leased for a term of twenty-one years at an annual rental of \$1 an acre. Not more than 2,500 acres will be leased to one applicant.

Application for a lease must be made by the applicant in person to the Agent or Sub-agent in the district in which the rights applied for are situated. In surveyed territory the land must be described by sections, or legal subdivisions of sections, and in unsurveyed territory the tract applied for shall be stated out by the applicant himself.

Each application must be accompanied by a fee of \$5 which will be refunded if the rights applied for are not available, but not otherwise. A royalty shall be paid on the merchantable output of the mine at the rate of five cents per ton.

The person operating the mine shall furnish the Agent with sworn returns accounting for the full quantity of merchantable coal mined and pay the royalty thereon. If the coal mining rights are not being operated, such returns should be furnished at least once a year.

The lease will include the coal mining rights only, but the lessee may be permitted to purchase whatever available surface rights may be considered necessary for the working of the mine at the rate of \$10.00 an acre. For full information application should be made to the Secretary of the Department of the Interior, Ottawa, or to any Agent or Sub-Agent of Dominion Lands.
