HARTLAND BRIDGE IS BEING REBUILT

Work Started Monday Morning and Will Continue Until Entirely New Structure Result

The bridge across the river at Hartland is to be entirely rebuilt and the work is already well underway. R. O. Fletcher of the Department of Public Works is in charge and has a large crew actively engaged. It is planned to put temporary repairs on the piers to safeguard them against the spring run of ice, and to erect three new permanent spans, so that the bridge will be safe for use immediately the ice ridge falls. Work will not stop at this, however, for the entire bridge will be rebuilt—the new piers erected during the summer and the remaining old spans renewed next winter. The spans will all be covered, a measure calculated to preserve the structure for a much longer period than if exposed to the weather as was the former bridge.

The new work is being done by the day and the workmen are chosen for their ability to perform the services required of them without regard to political affiliation. Ordinary workmen get \$3 a day, and skilled labor proportionately more.

The fact that the bridge is being rebuilt so soon is a revelation to the people of this county, who hitherto have been put off with promises and various methods of circumlocution for periods often extending over years. The fact is the bridge was condemned by the superintendent under the former administration, but his report was marked "Stand" and pigeon-holed by Hon. B. F. Smith then Minister of Public Works, and it was found still filed away when Hon. P. J. Veniot took office. When D. A. Campbell was appointed superintendent a little more than a year ago, his first report was as to the necessity of immediate attention to this bridge. Last autumn Mr. Veniot made a personal inspection and was convinced that no temporary repairs would be practicable and decided a new bridge would have to be built.

The desire of the government was to rebuild of concrete and steel, and if the people desired it, to change the location to any practicable site. When the minister came here a few weeks ago he met a delegation of representative

citizens and discovered that there was a unanimity of feeling that the bridge should be located wherever the engineer considered best but one thing the people would not stand for was delay or the resorting to a ferry. Accordingly Mr. Veniot consulted with other members of the government and in less than a week it was announced that Hartland bridge would be entirely rebuilt, and without delay of a day. So the work goes on.

RIGBY CASE THROWN OUT

Larlee Gets off on Suspended Sentence

In the case of the County Court last week in which A. R. Rigby of Hartland was charged with shooting with intent to do bodily harm, anolle proes qui was entered.

In this case the judge maintained that all the proceedings in regard to the laying out of the road had been illegal, but that Rigby's method of defending his property was rather more drastic than the circumstances required. Mr. Rigby claimed that he did not fire leaden bullets but used the special cartridges loaded with wooden pellets used for target practice in the training camps. It is claimed that these pellets will not penetrate the clothing beyond the distance of 30 yards.

The Observer was evidently in error in its assertion last week that all parties across whose land the proposed road ran had accepted settlement.

In the case of the King vs. Larlee, the returned soldier, who while acting as a dominion policeman was alleged to have extorted money from men without the proper papers on their person, the jury had brought in a verdict of guilty. The judge today suspended sentence in this case in view of the good military record and other reputation of the accused. The judge's course in this matter has met with the unqualified approval of the public as Larlee is a very prepossessing young man and very popular with those who know him.

In the case of the King vs. Charles W. Wright the jury found the accused guilty of common assault and he was fined \$50 or three months in jail.

Wright is a returned soldier and he and Dr. Martell met in a restaurant where it seems that Martell struck Wright for which Martell was fined before the police magistrate and shortly afterwards on the same evening Wright attacked Martell and inflicted severe wounds. Wright was charged before the County Court with doing actual bodily harm.

THE BAN IS AGAIN LIFTED

Churches to Hold Services on Sunday and Schools Re-open Next Week

Once again "the ban is lifted." This refers to the influenza epidemic, which in its second scourge caught more victims than the first, although the malady was not nearly in so severe form. The Observer knows of no death occurring in this vicinity as the direct outcome of the latest epidemic, but several have died from pneumonia after having had influenza.

The public will welcome, with feelings of relief and thanksgiving the re-opening of the churches, other places of public assembly, and the school. There have been no religious services in Hartland since the second Sunday in December, but the Chairman of the Board of Health has announced that public gatherings may now be held and the schools re-opened.

Religious services will be held on the coming Sunday as follows:

In the United Baptist church: Prayer meeting at 10:30, Sunday school 2:30, preaching service at 7:30. There will also be preaching service at Lower Brighton at 11 a.m. Rev. E. A. Trites, pastor.

Church of England service in the Town Hall at 11 and 7:30. Holy Communion will be celebrated at the morning service. Members will recall that it has been the usual custom to present the Xmas collection as a gift to the rector. There being no Christmas services the rector of Hartland has not received the usual donation except that a few took pains to remember the circumstance and sent in their envelopes. Those who have not done this are requested to use the Christmas envelope instead of the regular one at either service on Sunday. The wardens have asked The Observer to make a special note of this request.

Methodist appointments on the Hartland-Lindsay circuit for Sunday are as follows: Hartland 10:30, Sunday school at 2:30, also preaching service at 7:30. Service at Lindsay at 3. Rev. Spencer Crisp, pastor, and preacher for the day.

Services in the Reformed Baptist church on Sunday as follows: Social service at 10:30, Sunday school at 2:30, preaching service at 7:30. The pastor, Rev. F. J. Trafton, will also have service at Gordonsville at 11 and Landsdown at 3 o'clock.

The schools will re-open on Monday.

The Star Theatre will re-open on Saturday with a special program, 13th episode of "The Diamond from the Sky."

GETS MILITARY CROSS

Mr. and Mrs. Fred A. Boyer are being congratulated on the distinction that has been won by their son, Lieut. A. MacLeod Boyer, now with the 17th Battery, 5th Brig. C. Inf., at the present time stationed at "Bonnie-Rhine." Word has just been received that he has been awarded the Military Cross for conspicuous bravery during the advance near Cambrai after graduating from St. John High School. Lieut. Boyer entered Acadia University and while there enlisted with the 68th Battery at Woodstock. He took a draft overseas from that unit in January, 1917, and assisted in with the battery in Germany.

Lieut. Edwin J. McCallum, son of W. G. McCallum of Ashland, has also been awarded a Military medal.
