ADVERTISING RATES ON APPLICATION.

THE sale of the Upsalquitch  
river for fishing privileges is  
announced by the Government  
for to-day.

A universally signed petition in  
favour of the continuance of the  
rod license of last year has gone  
before the Government but it  
would appear to no avail and  
judging from the Chatham Ad-  
vance of a fortnight ago the mind  
of the Cabinet is fixed upon term  
lease. The Advance in defence  
of the Government's attitude ar-  
gues with the Upsalquitch ledger  
account before him and at the  
best, figures are unsatisfactory un-  
less supplemented by particulars.  
The Govt. explains that by rod  
lease the receipts were only about  
one-third in amount of cost of  
guardianship, say nothing of what  
a term lease would bring and the  
same is estimated at \$1000 per  
annum. To augment this it is  
argued, why the Upsalquitch al-  
one, why not other salmon rivers,  
and if this be true of fishing, why  
not apply it to hunting, crown  
lands, — and for aught we know,  
so on ad-infinitum.

Last year at the solicitations of  
this end of the county the Govt.  
was good enough to accede to the  
request of withholding the Upsal-  
quitch from term lease at their  
sale in the interests of tourist  
travel promotion but now the com-  
plaint of the people of Campbell-  
ton is that the Govt. is unwilling  
to give the new scheme a fair trial,  
that one year or rather one sea-  
son is purely introductory en-  
deavouring to inform the public  
that former things have passed  
away and that now there was  
such a thing as free salmon fish-  
ing.

We decidedly differ from Mr.  
Smith when he says that early in  
the season last year it was GEN-  
ERALLY known that there was  
practically free salmon fishing on  
the Upsalquitch.  
After years and years of en-  
quiry from the angling sportsmen  
(and no one can name the enquiry  
radius limit) to find that practi-  
cally every pool was within the  
grasp of American syndicates  
with every salmon in their pools  
bearing their brand, and add to  
this the effort of the millionaire  
fishermen to impress the idea, it  
is said that the fact of free fishing  
on one river within a couple of  
months of such conditions was  
very generally known. It could  
not be and such was not the case  
while improbability is stamped  
upon the face of it. The facts  
are that this year already the  
enquiry list of "is there any way  
in which salmon fishing can be  
had" or "are there any pools  
for salmon fishing not taken up  
by the clubs" or "are there any  
hopes of sometime getting free  
fishing" etc., far exceed last  
years total and already many  
have been advised of the free fish-  
ing on the Upsalquitch since it  
was generally thought that such  
would continue and answers were  
made in good faith.

Mr. Smith thinks that the an-  
gling tourist is well satisfied with  
trout fishing and that trout fishing  
is to be had for the fishing. We  
are only speaking for Campbellton

vicinity but the facts are here that  
there are no such tourists, the  
best trout fishing season is not the  
time of the tourist and as to  
thankfulness for free trout fishing  
we understand that the Govt. is  
anxious to destroy the trout fish-  
ing in the rivers since those fish  
prey upon the small salmon. The  
trout fishing is the past time of  
our own people and the fortunate  
guest or commercial traveller who  
happens along at the right time.  
What the angling tourist is  
after is a genuine struggle with a  
forty pound salmon and that one  
fight discounts all the trout fishing  
available; he can get that near  
home.

The Govt. now thinks that the  
Upsalquitch will bring \$1000 a  
year in the open market, and gen-  
eral opinion is the same; to-day's  
sale will settle that. This price  
is a decided jump from \$250, its  
valuation of a short time ago.  
What has effected the change?  
The efforts of the tourist associa-  
tion in advertising it and the  
jealous eye of the Club. The fact  
of that river's salmon fishing being  
practically free was a handle for  
the tourist association to work  
with and it appears to us that  
those jealously interested realized  
that and we have no doubt and  
we think the Govt. has less than  
that there will be ready bidders.  
The tourist association has done a  
good introductory work for en-  
hancing the value of our salmon  
fisheries; a work that will be felt  
again at the sale which will follow  
the termination of the present  
lease.

We think we need not go into  
the question of poaching; that is  
general and in inverse ratio to  
efficient wardenship. The Jacques  
River is leased and it is far from  
being moderately free from the  
poacher.

From the standpoint of dollars  
and cents with the provincial ex-  
chequer the Govt. certainly has  
the strong end of the argument at  
present and might so continue but  
there seems little uncertainty of  
the rod fees not almost defraying  
the cost of guardianship this year  
with only the present early out-  
look.

After all it would be a great  
satisfaction to the people here gen-  
erally to have one stream open to  
the public and the same reasoning  
would equally apply elsewhere  
under similar conditions but the  
argument is peculiarly suited to  
this district. Up here is the home  
of the angling clubs which have  
control of so much of the waters  
and the general complaint is from  
the people's standpoint that sup-  
plies are largely shipped in, that  
with their lodges every conveni-  
ence is within themselves, no  
branch of industry is particularly  
benefitted by their presence. This  
is in no way a censure on the  
clubs, they are here for an outing  
and we are only glad that the  
Restigouche and the other rivers  
do so well afford the pleasure they  
are after they pay the price asked  
and are good fellows but as to  
the benefits from their visits it is very  
clear that the resident business  
man prefer the other class of  
tourist, the one whose every need  
while amongst us is locally assisted.  
The first class of tourist comes and  
goes and without the news in the  
paper few would know of it while  
with the other class his every turn  
is helpful to some one.

Without taking into account the  
probability that one stream being  
free would enhance the value on  
the others, the receipts from free  
fishing would very shortly more  
than cover cost of protection, it  
isn't that outside complaints have  
been instituted against the situa-  
tion in Restigouche the Govt.  
would be encouraging a remuner-  
ative means of livelihood, and as to  
assistance for directing tourists this  
way, it will surely cost less to  
bring the same number of tourists  
when practically free salmon fish-  
ing is advertised than when en-  
quiries must be answered, that here

are undoubtedly the best salmon  
fishing streams in the world but  
they are all leased and none avail-  
able if you do come, unless the  
few remaining local owners of  
pools, in their kindness give you  
consideration.

## Projected Railroads in Gaspesia

We may judge by the news-  
papers that Messrs Lemieux and  
Marcil and the Atlantic, Quebec  
& Western Co. have joined against  
the Galindez syndicate, that has  
the control of the B. C. R.

Since about four years this  
Syndicate gives full satisfaction  
about its own work and its admin-  
istration. Can the people reason-  
ably require more than that? Can  
the government and our deputies  
prudently refuse a such Co., as  
long as they have no one of surer  
guarantee? Certainly not. In-  
deed, the opposition against its  
interests, pushed ahead by Mr.  
Lemieux, Marcil and Atlantic,  
Quebec & Western, is also against  
the interest of the population on  
the sea shore.

In fact, we read in the news-  
papers that these two deputies  
came down to Quebec to oppose,  
at the Legislative Council the bill  
of the Fraserville and Matapedia  
Ry. This R.R., being the shortest  
one, in any way, from Quebec to  
Europe via Gaspesia, would ben-  
efit a good deal the B. C. R. and  
certainly decide its completion al-  
ong the sea shore, in a very  
short time, thanks to the increas-  
ing commerce.

Can anybody, opposed to that,  
be considered a business man or a  
friend to the littoral interest? We  
do not think so.

About the B. C. R. itself, what  
do we see? The bondholders lend  
their money to secure the con-  
struction of this piece of road-  
rail. How many years are they  
expecting their returns? When  
will it be? Is it right to fight  
them when the out-look is bright  
for the future? Any fair minded  
man should answer: Not at all.

Mr. Marcil has helped the syn-  
dicate, but he has wronged it also.  
When Hon. Senator Landry  
moved the other year, that the  
name "Perce" should replace "Pas-  
peliac" in the bill of A. & L. S.  
Ry. for the continuation of the B.  
C. R. on the sea shore, because  
the work of this part of the road  
will be of an easy construction and  
of a favorable local trade, why  
did the same deputies fight this  
motion? How glad we would be  
if Mr. Marcil would tell his con-  
stituents why he did not put at  
least as an amendment: "from  
New Carlisle as far as the limits  
of Bonaventure County?"  
Really he neglected a nice oppor-  
tunity to show his good will and  
sincerity toward his constituents  
as regards the construction of the  
said part of the projected road.  
By that, we would have under-  
stood, as we already know, that  
it is nearly impossible for the  
County of Gaspesia to have the com-  
pletion of the sea shore R. R. as  
long as Mr. Lemieux is its deputy.

How unfair Mr. Lemieux is to  
his County about the sea shore  
R. R. He got petitions signed in  
our parishes, every year, since 1900  
On each one was a deceiving  
part, by which they asked, in the  
same time, signatures for the two  
road projected interior and littoral.  
When they were signed and re-  
turned, what have we seen on the  
bill at Ottawa and Quebec? Not  
a clause for the littoral road.  
Every disposition was for the  
interior projects, even on the bill  
of this year, at Ottawa.

More than that, Mr. Lemieux  
addressed to many of his friends  
in the county, a letter, dated the  
26th of February last, by which  
we understand that he would wish  
to see built in the interior, the  
piece of the B. C. R. already built  
along the littoral: We may judge  
by an extract of this letter: "Mr.

Armstrong and his friends are  
opposed to this bill because the  
new railway will be constructed  
where the Baie des Chaleurs Rail-  
way should be constructed since  
twenty years."

But if this piece of road was  
built in the interior, of what use  
would it be? Fortunately Mr.  
Lemieux was not the deputy of  
the County at that period of its  
construction.

Have we ever seen in the Do-  
minion such deceit? Indeed no.  
Can anybody be excused in be-  
lieving a little of Mr. Lemieux's  
present and future promises?  
Surely not.

Now, what is that Atlantic,  
Quebec & Western Co. Who has  
not been assured that it is almost  
composed of some of the members  
of the Coal Oil Co's of Gaspesia  
Basin? We read the same names  
in the newspapers.

How many times have we re-  
marked brilliant stories about the  
produce from the Gaspesia Oil Wells  
but who has yet seen a drop of  
its oil on the market? According  
to prudence the past teaches the  
future. Thence is it reasonable  
if we refuse to have confidence in  
that Co? It seems, indeed, to us  
very much so.

The fact that we see no man of  
means in Gaspesia or throughout  
the Dominion, who has joined this  
Co., up to now, seems to us that  
they have no faith in the project.  
Has this Co. succeeded in bor-  
rowing money on the market?  
By the Boer War excuse, seen in  
the newspapers, we may believe  
their success very small, since  
three years.

Did that Co. prove that they  
are good R. R. Constructors?  
Under the obligation of its charter  
has it built a piece of its interior  
road? Not an inch.

Could Mr. Lemieux and Marcil  
or the government give us a proof  
of any value about that Co? Sure-  
ly, it would not be the baromet-  
rical exploration now going on on  
snow shoes.  
Can we be blamed if we think  
Mr. Lemieux, Marcil and the  
government impose on Gaspesia  
the risks of a dying body? What  
a gloomy appearance for our  
future!
