The feeling of relief and satisfaction with which these men began the transaction of business yesterday was succeeded by considerable nervousness to-day as a result of the developments concerning the Knickerbocker Trust Company. The news made public last night and printed in the newspapers to-day that the National Bank of Commerce yesterday gave the content of wound decime to act as clearing house agent any longer for the Knickerbocker Trust Company, and the resignation of Charles T. Barney, of the presidency of that institution, served to unsettle conditions more than the Morse-Heinze developments of last week.
