DENTIST'S FUNERAL. Brantford Police After Parker, the Jail Breaker.

Archdeacon's Son Married—Relief Officer Resigns.

(Special Despatch to the Times.) Brantford, Jan. 11.—The funeral of the late Dr. W. F. Templar, the prominent dentist and real estate holder of this city, whose death by poisoning was recorded on Friday, took place here yesterday afternoon to Greenwood Cemetery, and was largely attended.

AFTER JAIL BREAKER. The authorities are again scouring the country for Miles Parker, horse thief and jail-breaker, who succeeded in getting away from the Brantford jail last summer. Traced to Hamilton by County Constable Kerr, Parker eluded pursuit from a house, which the constable visited with Detective Severs, a half hour too late. The latest stunt of the jail-breaker was to capture a horse and buggy at Delhi. He has not been seen since.

INTERESTING WEDDING. Norman S. Mackenzie, of Victoria, B. C., youngest son of Ven. Archdeacon Mackenzie, rector of Grace Church, and Miss Sarah Menchall, of this city, were quietly united in matrimony at Grace Church this afternoon. The ceremony was a quiet one, the rector, assisted by Rev. A. Mackenzie, of Lakefield, brother of the groom, officiating. The young couple will reside in British Columbia, where the groom is attached to the Bank of Commerce staff.

Tired of Job. Relief Officer Hunn, after 30 years of service, notified the new City Council to-day that he would quit on Friday. He resigned some time ago, but was pressed to stay with the job for two months longer; until a suitable man was secured. He has grown weary of doing out civic charity, and after Friday will seek a well earned rest.

INAUGURAL MEETING. The inaugural meeting of the new Citizens League City Council was held this morning and proved a tame affair as compared with proceedings in past years. A satisfactory slate was put through by the league. Mayor Wood, in his inaugural address, touched on many questions of civic importance, which, if handled by the Council during the year, will mark a new epoch in local municipal history. A congratulatory love-feast was also a feature of the proceedings.

THE LAZY CLUB. Plan of English Workmen to Discourage the Habit of Being Tardy. One of the best assets of a manufacturing plant is the interest of employees, and when this develops into friendly rivalry its value is many times increased. Frequently workmen will adopt methods spontaneously that are of great assistance to the firm.

STUNNING SERVICE. In the engineering shops of a certain English firm the workmen a year or two ago originated what they called the Lazy Club. It was entirely their own idea, which for obvious reasons has received neither recognition nor financial support from the management, but has been a most excellent means of reducing the number of late comers.

When a workman is more than five minutes after he finds the gate locked and he is not allowed to enter until the bell hour is up. This half hour is deducted from his wages, but in addition he has also to pay to the treasurer of the Lazy Club about five cents for coming late.

It is late more than once or so during a week everybody is aware of the fact, and the second or third time he makes his appearance after starting time he is greeted with a terrific combination of noises produced on any available material by his fellow workmen.

At certain periods the accumulated funds of the Lazy Club are divided, not among those who have produced them, it should be noted, but among the entire staff equally. Thus the late workman is made to pay the early comers for his laziness. The last distribution was just prior to a breakfast, and funds accumulated during twelve months were distributed amounting to over seven shillings a head.—System.
