Shipping-cattle have not been offered, but good storers averaging from 1,300 to 1,560 lbs would have found ready buyers at \$5 had they been in. First-class, or the nearest approach to them in the market consisting generally of the pickings of ease, have-sold at \$4.25 to \$4.50. Second-class have been less abundant and in increased demand, and firmer in price at \$4.50 to \$4. with, all offering taken for the local market. Third-class also have sold rather more readily than in the previous week, and have been steady at \$2.75 to \$3.25. Prices show very little change. Fowl have sold at 30 to 35c in lots; and 40 to 45c for single pairs. Ducks have been firm at 50 to 65c. Geese have heen weak at 40 to 68e, according to quality. Turkeys have been less abundant than other sorts and remain at 60c to \$1. Box lots are less abundant and firmer at 74 to 62 per 1b for turkeys and ducks, and 5c for fowl and geese. preferred to hold on in hopes of still higher prices. Receipts have fallen off, which decrease is probably lue in a great measure to the miserable state of the country roads. 
