OTTAWA, March 2. — Demands that the Union Government should once introduce a Franchise Bill that a general election should be brought on immediately, Hon. Mackenzie King, the Liberal leader in the House of Commons yesterday afternoon made a spirited attack on the Administration. He criticized his criticism in an amendment which he moved, seconded by J. D. McKenzie, to the Address in reply to the Speech from the Throne.

## Foster's Satire.

Speaking after recess, the Acting Prime Minister, Sir George Foster, replied to the wholesale denunciation of the Government by the Liberal Opposition. He spoke for an hour and a half. Sir George held out no hope at the request of the Liberals could be met. Instead, he characterized the action of Mr. King as a "strategical camouflage," which could be taken because the Liberals were reasonably sure that the amendment would be defeated. "Has my honorable friend any lurking shadowy disaster to himself in this question should be acted upon?" asked the Acting Premier.

The following sketch of the career and achievements of Dr. Murray Clark, Toronto, but who is known to a large number of St. Catharines residents, having married Miss Chapman of this city, appeared in National Geographic Magazine. It is a synopsis as given by Dr. W. L. Goodwin, Dean of the Faculty of Science, Queen's University, Kingston, who had the honor of presenting Mr. Clark for the degree of L.L.D., in that noted institution among other things Dr. Goodwin said: "It is with rather unusual pleasure that I carry out the will of the Senate and the Senate of Queen's University in presenting for an honorary degree Mr. J. Murray Clark, M.A., L.L.D., etc. It is usual on such occasions to give an account of the career and achievements of the recipient of the degree. Mr. Clark has been an exceptionally industrious and successful man in that any account of his life and work must be just a simple, carefully taken.
