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FIERCE RIOT IN THE PANAMA CANAL ZONE

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KIDNAPPER BOYLE'S SIGNED STATEMENT

Facing Sentence of Life Imprisonment—James Boyle Confesses and Implicates Uncle of Willie Whittle, the Boy Who Was Kidnapped—Forker Originated the Kidnapping, Boyle Says.

Pittsburg, May 11.—Before he was freed from here to the penitentiary, James Boyle gave out an interview to be used under his name. It is in part as follows:

"By James H. Boyle, Monday, May 10, 1909. The complete story of the kidnapping of Willie Whittle, the origin of the same and what led up to it.

"On the morning of — between the hours of — Dan Reble was working on the sidewalk in front of the Mauser block, E. 12th street, Youngstown, and over the porch form was Mr. Harry Forker of Sharon, Pa., holding in his right hand a package of letters that were gathered from the sidewalk near the body of Mr. Reble.

"As he was about to depart from the vicinity he was intercepted by the writer and a man who has since passed the his record, Mr. Dan Shay, a saloon keeper of Oak street, Youngstown, Ohio.

"Mr. Forker, in his hurry to leave, handed me two envelopes which contained four letters. The same were picked up by Mr. Shay, and later taken to his place of business on Oak street.

"The writer and Mr. Shay examined and read the contents of some, which were in fact letters from Willie Whittle. Mr. Forker there at that time.

"Held up Forker. The letters were written by a lady. I intended to leave New York state, and the other from Cleveland, Ohio. At a later date Mr. Forker was apprised of the fact that the writer had these letters in his possession, and asked if he could use the same. Mr. Forker acknowledged he would pay a sum of money for the possession of the letters, but the amount not being considered sufficient, was refused, and from that day on and up till March, 1909, he remained silent.

"On my leaving Sharon on March 12, 1909, I proceeded to Cleveland, Ohio, and on the same evening I addressed to Forker at Sharon a letter which read as follows:

"Insists on Payment. I have decided not to wait any longer in regard to the money question, and if I do not hear from you soon there will be some exposing."

"On March 16, 1909, I received an answer to my letter, which read as follows: "Friend Bailey—You know the circumstances and the promise I made you when you left here, but if you are really in need of money, as you profess to be, I will outline a little plan which, with your co-operation, will result in your being able to get out of here, and on Tuesday, viz: the abduction of J. P. Whittle's son. I can arrange to have the boy brought to Warren, Ohio, due about 11:30 with an escort."

"There is no signature to the letter. "I left Cleveland at 8:15 a.m. and arrived at Warren, later the boy and escort arrived.

"The Boy Recognized. I brought the boy to Niles, Ohio, and from there to Ashland, and then to Cleveland. On March 22 I received a letter from Mr. Forker, stating that some one had informed Mr. Whittle that they had recognized his boy on March 18, in Niles, Ohio, and that James Boyle, of Sharon, was with him, also that Mr. Whittle was afraid to divulge the information for fear the boy might come to some harm, and asking me to be on the alert and that when I received the money to immediately surrender those Youngstown letters and send same to him."

"Mr. Forker, at Sharon, and on Tuesday, April 23, to return half of the ransom money to him, and he would turn over the same to the party who took Willie Whittle to Warren.

"Promised no Prosecution. Upon learning that my name was mentioned in connection with the case I made it a point to meet Mr. Whittle personally in Cleveland on 53rd street and St. Clair avenue, showed him the letters that passed between Forker and myself, also the Youngstown letters, and Mr. Whittle promised that if I would substantiate the truth of the Youngstown letters he would see there would be no prosecution.

"I then surrendered, through Mr. Whittle, all the letters and the world knows the rest. I was arrested and convicted and deprived by my own counsel of telling my story on the stand. I informed my wife the boy was brought in order to escape being quarantined in the pest house, and we were to be handsomely rewarded for taking care of him.

"The unfortunate woman was duped from start to finish in regard to the boy, and I was duped the moment I let the letters go into Mr. Whittle's possession."

"Quebec Election Appeal Allowed. Ottawa, May 10.—In the Supreme court this morning the Quebec election appeal of Price vs. Neville was allowed in part with costs. Powers vs. Price, the cross appeal, was dismissed with costs.

"Kinrade Family in Montreal. Montreal, May 10.—Passengers on this morning's train from Toronto, claim that Florence Kinrade, her mother, and Wright, the divinity student, were on board and came to Montreal. They said they were looking for a Quebec summer resort.
