Of the fatal cases 31 per cent, took the mercury treatment and 68 per cent. took the outine treatment only. From this favorable showing Surgeon Wright has mmended that mercury be adopted as the regular treatment for tuberculosis at Las Animas, making it compulsory at the discretion of the hospital staff.

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
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
