At the point of their revolvers they awoke the young woman and forced her to dress. Then they pushed and dragged her through a rear exit into a waiting automobile, according to Ivanoff's story.

Brazilian at one time sold off to 81, or 1-5 below closing level of Saturday, and recovered only half the loss. C.P.R. fell 204 7/8 here. Closing bid was slightly firmer at 205.

Winnipeg, March 17.—Wheat—Not sufficient volume of trade today to create any important feature of special interest. Cables steady and fractionally higher, early prices in all markets fractionally over yesterday, but the last hour of the session brought values fractionally easier in all markets, the net loss being 1-3 to 1-4 for the day.
Cash market firm, differences based the option unchanged from yesterday, 1, 2 and 3 wheat in good demand. Seaboard advices were to the effect that private cable bids showed some improvement from spring delivery, the better inquiry reflecting preference to Manitoba. Buyers and sellers not very far apart in their ideas for spring delivery. Northern changed hands at 17-8 under the May basis store opening.

The action of the market, however, suggests the trade up to date is not taking this information seriously.
Tenor of the trade at the close of business tonight suggests a little lowering of values may be seen, but we are of the opinion that the possibilities remain on the bull side of the market for the time being and an outright conservative operation on recessions.

Oats—Featureless, about unchanged in price. Cash demand quiet, eastern advices to the effect that a little more encouragement offered in cable bids, but no volume of business possible, and while all grades out of line for export, bids a little better than they were of late.

Barley—Unchanged, dull trade, but firm around present levels.
Flax—Fractionally easier, in sympathy with Duluth. It is noticeable on any weakness in Duluth. It is almost impossible to sell flax in this market without forcing lower values. It is a nervous trade with local takers taking their lead entirely from American centres.
