Making One's Self Ugly.

What a very big difference for better or for worse this expression can make in a face! Beside me on the trolley the other day sat a woman who, at first glance seemed to me extraordinarily ugly. Then I looked again and saw that half the ugliness of her came from her position and expression. She had one hand at her face and was pulling out her lower lip. Her brows were knit in deep thought, and, however well that sounds in fiction, in fact it is a very unbecoming forward. Her shoulders were stooped forward. She would never have been pretty, she had a very large nose and a coarse skin, but she would not have been ugly enough to draw a second glance of distaste if she hadn't distorted her face by her expression.

Keep The Hands Away From The Face.

Children ought to be trained not to put their hands to their faces. The skin of the face is delicate and suffers unnecessary contamination from the dirt and germs which the hands are likely to carry.

Rubbing the eyes is a particularly vicious trick of this sort. I know a girl who lost half her eyelashes from an inflammation of the eyes and lids caused by rubbing the eyes and getting germs into them.

People who talk with their hands in front of their faces are a nuisance. You have to guess at what they are saying half the time.

Nervousness is the cause of most of the unpleasant tricks. We don't know what to do with our hands.

and so we continually employ them in nervous unnecessary motions. Can You Let Your Hands Be Gracefully Idle?

The person who can let his hands lie gracefully in his lap or on the arms of the chair, has acquired one of the fine arts of social converse.

A short course (short, because everything has to be short in these days) in expression and repose would benefit most of us.

I looked around the car after analyzing my unlovely neighbor and saw at least half a dozen more men and women who were distorting their faces in one way or another.

The people who were reading were the most free from disfiguring expressions. They were interested, and when we are interested we are apt to look more intelligent and be less nervous and ill at ease.

Some Of These Weeds Of Ugliness Have Deep Roots.

Some unlovely expressions are the result of inward unloveliness. "When sin is in the heart it leaps out on the face." Such unhealthy states of mind as discontent, sensuality, meanness, etc., stamp themselves on the face.

But there are other disfiguring expressions that are only unnecessary facial tricks. These are weeds whose roots are just under the surface and which could be pulled up with a little effort.

Self-consciousness is an unpleasant trait when one has too much of it, but we need enough to control our expressions and not make ourselves unnecessarily hard to look at.

ASQUITH'S CHEERING VOICE

LADYBANK, Scotland, June 15.—In observance of the thirtieth anniversary of his election to the Commons from East Fife, Premier Asquith to-day visited his constituency for the first time since the outbreak of the war. Addressing a gathering of his supporters, many of whom in past years had been his opponents, the Premier made touching reference to the death of Field Marshal Lord Roberts as leaving a place in our national life that no one else could fill, and a memory that will live in the British Empire. Lord Roberts had bequeathed to the country a ray of armies, said the Premier, was for the country to make use of these. In a survey of the situation, Asquith declared that the advance was one of the most brilliant feats of the war. The Italian Asquith said, were making a head to the Austrian onslaught every day was becoming more and more As for the French nothing exceeded the valor with which they sustained the defence of the Co-operation among the generals of the Allies was becoming intimate and complete every British assistance had been to General Joffre; the steps would be taken were those by sound strategy. It is a material and economic resource these will prove in the long run deciding factors. After speaking the effectiveness of the navy, Asquith said that owing to rashness of the enemy we were ed to see another more dramatic aspect of the war, a fortnight ago. The Nation of May 31st was worthy of the most treasured traditions of the British Navy.
