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LONDON, To-day. The threat of reprisals by the British Government for the sinking of hospital ships has issued following the German admiralty statement, that the Admiralty had convincing evidence that hospital ships were frequently misused for the transportation of ammunition and troops. This statement said that hospital ships passing on the military route of hostile armies engaged in France and Belgium, which were then in the lines of Flamborough Head and Terschelling on the one hand and Land's End Point on the other, would be no more treated as such, but that Germany's enemies would be free to use such vessels for the transportation of wounded and sick army members outside of this district, barring other sea routes reserved in case of further misuse of hospi tal ships in violation of international law. The reply of the British Government denied the German Admiralty's allegation and pointed out that Germany had a right to search hospital ships in case of suspicion, a remedy which they never had utilized. 
