He wishes to be remembered to his friends here and says he would like very much to be able to pay a "flying visit" home. Jack is a member of the First Newfoundland Battalion, is a Gallipoli and France veteran and was four times wounded, though he has never yet been granted a furlough.

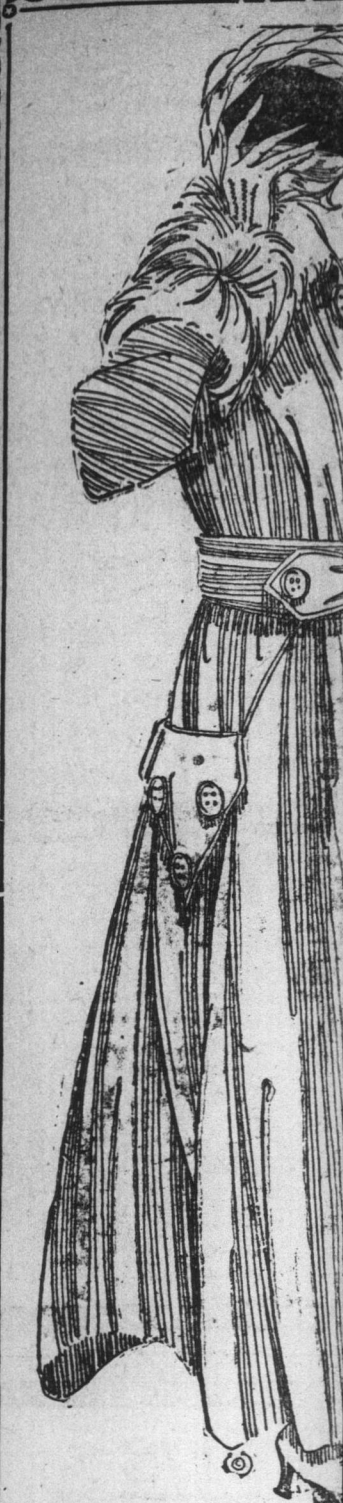
M. C. L. I.

The subject for debate at the M. C. L. I. last night was: "Resolved, That an Interdenominational Normal School for Training of Teachers is a present necessity and is feasible." The leaders for the affirmative were the Rev. Dr. Curtis and Messrs. Wilson Clarke and White; for the negative, Messrs. S. P. Whiteway, R. Henderson and B. Edgecombe. The affirmative contended it was a regrettable state of affairs that we lacked the blessing of such an institution as an Interdenominational Normal School for teachers. The teaching profession needed specialization the same as the profession of lawyers, doctors and clergymen. The negative asked if such an institution was necessary to raise the standard of the teaching profession. Littledale Academy, Bishop Spencer, Bishop Field, the Methodist and St. Bon's Colleges had all proved splendid institutions for turning out qualified teachers. Teaching was a natural art and should be careful not to introduce methods that might do more harm than good.

Messrs. Woods, Bowden, Grimshaw, Haywood, Moore, Pratt, Parkins, Power and others took part in the discussion. On a vote being taken the affirmative won by a substantial majority.
